Simply put, AI is like a computer program that can think and learn (somewhat) like a human. AI has access to way more information than any human can have, which helps to process information or answer questions. (Learn more about the wonders of AI in Chapter 2.)

AI tools can help you improve the quality and accuracy of your work by detecting and correcting errors, suggesting alternatives, or offering feedback. Furthermore, AI writing tools can help you expand their creativity and diversity by generating original text based on different inputs, data, or models. They can also introduce new words, phrases, or sources to diversify the writer’s vocabulary and references.

# Pairing WI and AI from Outline to Finished Proposal

To show you just how powerful AI can be in grant writing, let's look at a real-world example with a proposal writer named Luis. We'll walk through a project of his where traditional expertise and AI teamed up to save a historic building from the 1700s. This case highlights how AI's smart features, such as creating tailored proposals and analyzing data, made a big difference in landing the grant.

## Creating an outline

Luis was tasked with writing a proposal to preserve a historical home in Sudbury, Massachusetts, USA. He was working to a very tight deadline. Although Luis was a seasoned proposal writer, this type of proposal was something he'd never dealt with before. Most of the proposals he'd written involved medical research. So he turned to ChatGPT, and prompted it to create an outline for preserving this historical home. (Learn more about writing prompts in Chapter 5.) In Figures 1-1 and 1-2 you see the two-page outline AI generated.

## Learning of funding opportunities

Luis then prompted ChatGPT to find several funding opportunities available for historic preservation in the Sudbury, Massachusetts, area. Here are some potential sources of funding AI discovered:

- » Massachusetts Cultural Facilities Fund (CFF)
- » Massachusetts Historical Commission (MHC) Preservation Grants
- » Community Preservation Act (CPA) funds
- » Massachusetts Cultural Council (MCC) grant

Preserving a historical site in Massachusetts is an endeavor that requires careful planning, community involvement, and a clear vision for conservation and accessibility. Here's a proposal outline:

## Working towards the finish line

Now Luis was ready to write the proposal, but he still felt unsure of how to proceed. Once again he turned to ChatGPT. He prompted the chatbot (see Chapter 2) to write a proposal to preserve The Eric Marks house in Sudbury, Massachusetts, and he included lots of details. It was a place Washington and his troops had spent the night during the Revolutionary War, and the mission of the project is to turn this historical home into a museum.

In Figures 1–3 through 1–8 you see the completed grant proposal. AI created the draft and Luis added his much-needed WI in the following ways:

- » Opening with a heartwarming story. (Check out Chapter 3 to become an ace storyteller.)
- » Adding “Legacy to Liberty” to jazz up the title.
- » Expanding each headline to contain meaningful information.
- » Transforming the text into a more natural tone by blending factual accuracy with approachable language. (Learn more about tone in Chapter 14.)
- » Including ethical considerations.
- » Speaking to the hearts and minds of the grant reviewers.

*Spoiler alert:* Luis sent this proposal to several of the prospective grantors AI sourced for him. Two of them jointly supplied the needed funding and the restoration was in progress at the time of writing.

## Ensuring that You Maintain the Human Touch



REMEMBER

Yes, this book is about AI. But don't forget that without human intelligence there would be no artificial intelligence. It's the creativity, ingenuity, and problem-solving abilities of humans that fueled the development and advancement of AI, making our partnership with technology an essential component of progress and innovation.



Although AI can certainly aid in developing a grant proposal, the human touch is what will ultimately tip the scales towards winning the grant. Grantors don't hand out funding for proposals that sound as if they're reciting code, rather they hand out funding that speaks from the heart. Here's why the human element is crucial:

- » **Persuading and connecting:** The human element lets proposal writers establish a personal connection with the grant reviewers, making it more likely that they'll empathize with the cause and be persuaded by the proposal.
- » **Crafting persuasive narratives/stories:** Framing a relevant story within a compelling narrative can capture the attention of the grant reviewers and leave a lasting impression. Humans are skilled at crafting narratives that engage and persuade. They can use their creativity and emotional intelligence to present ideas in a way that captures the grantor's attention and convinces them of the value proposition. (Learn more about storytelling in Chapter 3.)
- » **Understanding the grantor's needs and building relationships:** This requires strong and effective communication, active listening, and empathy. Humans are able to connect with reviewers on a personal level, understand their points, and tailor grant proposals to meet their specific requirements.
- » **Collaborating and teamwork:** Humans can work together, leveraging their diverse skills and perspectives to create comprehensive and well-rounded grant proposals. Collaboration fosters innovation, ensures all aspects are addressed, and increases the overall quality of the proposal.
- » **Bringing flexibility and adaptability:** Sometimes adjustments are needed based on the grantor's feedback or changing circumstances. Humans can quickly respond to changes, devise alternative approaches, and modify proposals accordingly.
- » **Customizing solutions:** Only humans can assess the situation, ask relevant questions, and tailor solutions that address the specific needs of the grantor.
- » **Building trust and credibility:** Anecdotes, stories, testimonials, examples, and other things humanize the proposal and build trust.



Here's another reason why humans remain relevant. I needed to write something quickly and turned to my reliable AI tool — only it turned out to be not so reliable on this occasion. For nearly half an hour I kept getting the following message:

*We're experiencing exceptionally high demand. Please try again later.*

When my brain is “experiencing exceptionally high demand” I can't make excuses. So I wrote the message myself — the old-fashioned way — using my WI.

Something else happened that totally reminded me of how reliant I've become on technology. My husband and I were off to Spain. Before we left, we made arrangements for a rental car, got an international driver's license, and called my cell-phone service provider to get set up for international service. Easy, right? They even sent me a text confirming that they charged the international fee to my credit card. Perfect, I thought. But guess what? When we landed in Spain, I had no international service!

But it was the bigger picture that jolted me, and here's why: Back in the day — before GPS and smartphones — my husband and I drove around many European countries, New Zealand, Bali, and elsewhere with just detailed maps and our own wits. But now, without my phone, I felt totally vulnerable. Yes, we had the GPS in the car, so finding our way around was no problem, but each time we got in the car I kept having these nagging feelings: What if we need help? What if the car breaks down and we're stranded on a road that's not well traveled? And worse, yet, what if we have an accident? Those questions never entered my mind before the cell-phone era. Anyway, when we got back home, I gave the service provider a call. It turns out that the person I talked to never finished setting up the transaction, and they just credited the fee to my next month's bill.

This incident really got me thinking about our increasing dependence on technology, especially as it relates to AI. Relying too heavily on these tools can undermine our confidence and even dull our natural writing talent. It's like we're outsourcing our skills (and brains) to machines, and if something goes wrong with the technology, we feel abandoned. It's important to strike a balance.



WARNING

We should embrace AI for its convenience and efficiency, but never let it overshadow our own abilities, creativity, and confidence. After all, our talent and confidence are what make us truly capable, unique, and indispensable.

## Knowing that AI Dependence Can Be Costly

Imagine a world where chefs rely solely on kitchen robots to cook their meals. At first it seems ideal — perfectly cooked dishes every time, with no risk of burning or under-seasoning. But soon, the charm of human creativity in the kitchen begins to fade. The robots churn out dishes according to pre-programmed recipes, lacking the flair and personal touch that human chefs bring to their craft. Each plate looks identical, tasting fine but lacking that special spark that makes a meal memorable.

People start to miss the unexpected twists, the experimental flavors, and the passion that human chefs infuse into their cooking. In this culinary dystopia, creativity becomes standardized, and innovation takes a backseat to efficiency. The joy of discovering new tastes and techniques fades away as people become accustomed to the predictability of robot-cooked meals. Eventually, they realize that while robots may excel at following instructions, they can never replicate the magic of a human chef. The same holds true for AI-generated output.



WARNING

Grant proposals require precision, accuracy, and persuasiveness to secure funding for important projects. Here's how the pitfalls of relying solely on AI for writing can relate to grant proposals:

- » **Hallucinations and inaccuracies:** *Hallucinations*, in AI-speak, are when a chatbot generates incorrect or fabricated information. Grant proposals need to present accurate information about the project, its goals, methodologies, and expected outcomes. Relying solely on AI for writing may result in inaccuracies or nonsensical statements, which can undermine the credibility of the proposal and diminish the chances of securing funding.
- » **Outdated information:** Grantors often look for innovative and current projects to fund. Using AI without human

oversight may lead to proposals that fail to incorporate the latest research, trends, or best practices in the field, making the proposal less compelling and less likely to receive funding.

- » **Lack of contextual understanding:** Grant proposals require a deep understanding of the project's context, including its relevance to the field, its potential impact, and the needs of the target population. AI may struggle to grasp the nuances of these contexts, resulting in proposals that lack depth or fail to effectively communicate the significance of the project.
- » **Over-reliance on templates:** Some AI writing tools offer pre-made templates for grant proposals. While these templates can be helpful as a starting point, relying too heavily on them may result in proposals that sound formulaic or generic, failing to stand out from the competition.
- » **Ethical concerns:** Grant proposals must adhere to ethical standards, including honesty, transparency, and integrity. Using AI to generate content without proper oversight may raise ethical concerns, such as plagiarism or the misrepresentation of data, which can damage the reputation of the applicant and jeopardize the success of the proposal.
- » **Bias and fairness:** AI systems can sometimes perpetuate biases that are present in the data they were trained on. It's crucial to review AI-generated content for any potential biases that might affect the proposal's tone or content.
- » **Security risks:** Grant proposals may contain sensitive information, such as budget details, project timelines, or proprietary research findings. Relying solely on AI for writing without proper security measures in place may expose this information to unauthorized access or misuse, compromising the confidentiality and integrity of the proposal.

## Remembering that Human Grant Writers are Irreplaceable

You can't (and I repeat *can't*) be replaced by AI. No how! No way! The effectiveness of a grant proposal hinges on the nuanced understanding, empathy, and ability to craft persuasive narratives

tailored to diverse audiences and funding requirements — elements that are beyond today's AI's capabilities:

- » **Updated information:** Chatbots spew out what they were programmed to know. That doesn't necessarily include the most current information. Only humans can supply that.
- » **Empathy and human connection:** Beyond presenting facts and figures, successful grant writing often relies on building trust and rapport with funders. Human grant writers can understand the motivations and concerns of funders on a personal level, allowing them to tailor proposals in a way that resonates emotionally. This human touch fosters genuine connections, increasing the likelihood of funding.
- » **Flexibility and adaptability:** Grant writing is dynamic, often requiring quick responses to changes in project scope, funding criteria, or external factors. Human grant writers can swiftly pivot their approach, incorporating new information or adjusting strategies to meet evolving needs. Their ability to think on their feet and adapt strategies accordingly is a valuable asset in the competitive landscape of grant applications.
- » **Storytelling and creativity:** While AI can generate content based on existing patterns and create interesting stories from your prompts, it lacks the innate creativity and emotional intelligence required for original storytelling. Human writers can craft narratives that not only convey the project's objectives but also resonate with the values and interests of the funding organization. Through engaging storytelling, they can evoke empathy, inspire action, and leave a lasting impression on grant reviewers. (Check out Chapter 3 to learn more about storytelling.)
- » **Contextual understanding:** Successful grant proposals go beyond outlining project details; they demonstrate a deep understanding of the broader context in which the project operates. Humans can contextualize their proposals within relevant social, economic, and political frameworks, showcasing how the project addresses specific needs or challenges. This contextual insight not only enhances the credibility of the proposal but also demonstrates the writer's grasp of the project's significance within its larger context.

» **Knowing your organization:** To write a successful grant proposal you must make your organization and the people within it shine. AI without WI intervention spews out text based on patterns and will make everyone blend in with the background noise.



REMEMBER

Human grant writers will always remain the superheroes of funding, swooping in to save the day for important projects and initiatives. With AI as their virtual sidekick, together they form an unstoppable duo in the grant-writing adventure!

# Navigating AI at Your Own Pace

On the other hand, there's WI — the human touch of the proposal writer who brings the narrative to life, infusing it with compelling stories that could charm even the most skeptical grant reviewer. (Journey into the world of storytelling by checking out Chapter 3.) But this collaboration goes beyond mere storytelling. While AI handles the numbers and analyzes past successes at a pace that seems almost supernatural, WI gets to showcase creativity, transforming dry data into a narrative so captivating it could rival the latest binge-worthy series on a streaming platform.

Together, WI and AI create a synergy that maximizes efficiency and impact in writing grant proposals. It's a partnership that combines the best of both worlds — humans and

machines — harnessing human creativity with the strengths of technology to achieve remarkable results in the competitive world of grant acquisitions.



Whether you want to sit back and learn more about AI before getting your feet wet, you're ready to dip one toe in the water, or you're ready for to use comprehensive AI tools, this chapter guides you through these options to writing winning grant proposals.

## Learning AI Lingo



Today AI is on the tip of everyone's tongue, but it won't be long before it's at the end of every proposal writer's fingertips. So, wherever you are in the process, it behooves you to learn the lingo. Here are some of the commonly used terms:

- » **Algorithm:** A set of rules or instructions to solve a problem or complete a task. In AI, algorithms are used to process data, learn from it, and make decisions based on that data.
- » **Artificial intelligence (AI):** The simulation of human intelligence processes by machines, especially computer systems. These processes include learning (the acquisition of information and rules for using the information), reasoning (using rules to reach approximate or definite conclusions), and self-correction.
- » **Bias:** Systematic errors that result in unfair outcomes, such as favoring one group over another. It often stems from the data used to train the AI systems and can lead to discrimination or other ethical issues.
- » **Chatbot:** A clever computer program that's always up for a chat 24/7, ready to answer queries and lend a hand with specific tasks.
- » **Classification:** A task in machine learning where the goal is to categorize input data into one of several predefined classes or categories.
- » **Data:** Information, often in the form of facts or statistics, collected for analysis. Data is the fuel for AI systems, as they require large amounts of data to learn from and make accurate predictions from.

WARNING

- » **Dataset:** A collection of related data organized in a structured format, often used for analysis, research, or training models.
- » **Data mining:** The process of analyzing datasets in order to discover new patterns that might improve the model.
- » **Deepfake:** Synthetic media created using AI to manipulate or replace original content, often in videos, to depict events that never occurred or people saying and doing things they never said or did. (This is bad stuff!)
- » **Deep learning:** A subset of machine learning where artificial neural networks learn from large amounts of data. Deep learning algorithms can learn features directly from data without relying on handcrafted features.
- » **GPT (generative pre-trained transformer):** A family of transformer-based language generation models developed by OpenAI. GPT models are trained on vast amounts of text data and can generate coherent and contextually relevant text based on a given prompt.
- » **Hallucination:** In the context of AI, hallucinations happen when the system generates inaccurate, incoherent, or nonsensical information, typically due to errors or limitations in its training, understanding, or processing capabilities. It's a hiccup that can make an AI system unreliable.
- » **Large language model (LLM):** A large language model is a powerful AI system built on extensive data and sophisticated algorithms, enabling it to understand, generate, and manipulate human language with remarkable proficiency.
- » **Machine learning (ML):** A subset of AI that enables systems to learn from data without being explicitly programmed. It focuses on the development of computer programs that can access data and use it to learn for themselves.
- » **Model:** A representation of a system used to make predictions or decisions based on input data. In machine learning, a model learns from training data to make predictions on new, unseen data.
- » **Natural language processing (NLP):** A branch of AI that focuses on the interaction between computers and humans through natural language. It involves tasks such as text generation, sentiment analysis, and language translation.

- » **Neural network:** This is like a super-smart web of interconnected neurons (nerve cells) that learns patterns and makes decisions by analyzing lots of data.
- » **Prompt:** An AI prompt is a specific input, often in the form of text or voice, that's provided to an AI system to generate a desired output or response. In essence, it's AI-speak for posing a question. (There's lots to learn about prompts in Chapter 5).
- » **Training data:** The dataset used to train a machine learning model. It consists of input data points and their corresponding correct output labels, which the model uses to learn patterns and make predictions.

## Absorbing AI Wisdom from the Backseat

Perhaps you're not ready to use AI tools just yet but want to learn more than just the lingo (outlined in the previous section). That's a personal choice, and it's perfectly fine to focus on traditional grant-writing methods. However, it's to your benefit to learn about these tools and stay informed about advances in the field so you can jump in when necessary. Exploring AI tools and their uses can help with:

- » **Understanding AI technology:** Learning about AI writing tools can help you understand how they work, their capabilities, and their limitations. Gaining insight into the potential impact of AI on the writing industry helps you make informed decisions about incorporating AI into your grant-writing process in the future.
- » **Keeping up with industry trends:** Staying informed about AI writing tools can be valuable for your professional growth as a grant writer and may open up new opportunities or collaborations in the future. Here's a little tip: Set up Google Alerts for topics related to grantmaking to receive regular updates and stay ahead of the curve. Check out <https://www.google.com/alerts?hl=en> to learn how.
- » **Exploring new possibilities:** By learning about AI tools, you can explore new possibilities and consider how they might complement or enhance your own grant-writing abilities.

» **Adapting to changing demands:** By familiarizing yourself with AI writing tools, even if you're not ready to dip a toe in the water, you'll be able adapt to changing demands and be prepared for potential shifts in the writing landscape when your grant writing requires it.

In the early days of AI — which wasn't all that long ago — I had been absorbing wisdom from the backseat, and curiosity started to bubble within me. While I wasn't quite prepared to use AI for proposal writing, I decided to dabble in some playful stuff. It was simple as typing <https://chatgpt.com> into my browser (as outlined in the next section). So, with a mischievous grin, I threw down the gauntlet and wrote a prompt. Lo and behold, ChatGPT accepted my challenge. Here's the "conversation."

**Prompt:** *Give me a few witty lines about a cup of coffee.*

**AI's response:** *In a parallel universe, coffee cups are sentient beings. They gather in secret societies, plotting to overthrow the humans who keep them perpetually empty. Their motto: "Espresso yourself!" Hope this brings a smile to your face!*

Wow! I recall thinking. This is really amazing. I flirted with the chatbot and it returned my affection. I was hooked. That was my first foray into the world of AI. It was soon thereafter that I was not dipping just one toe in the water, but jumping in with both feet.

## Getting Started with AI

If you're not ready to (or don't yet have the need to) jump into comprehensive AI-generated technology, try dipping one toe in the water with an easy-to-use chatbot, such as one of those listed in Chapter 1.



REMEMBER

Why consider using a chatbot instead of relying solely on Google search? A Google search can provide you with abundant links, but it often requires you to sift through multiple pages to find the information you're looking for. Additionally, many companies use search engine optimization (SEO) techniques to rank higher in search results, potentially burying the information you want on page two or three. Instead, a chatbot grants you immediate access to information within seconds.

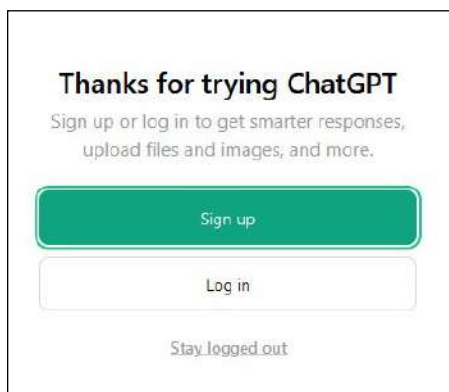
## Seeing is believing

It's really easy to get started! I'll use ChatGPT as an example because it's the most popular chatbot.

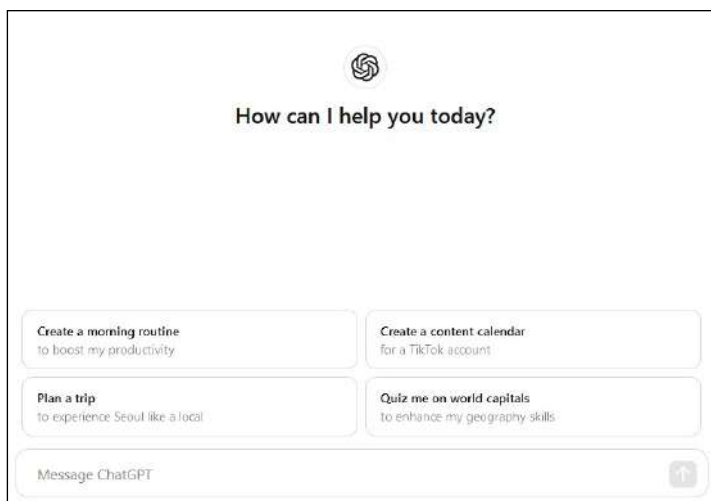
1. **Type `https://chatgpt.com` or *ChatGPT* into your browser (see, you don't even need to type the full URL!).** Figure 2-1 shows you the homepage this takes you to.
2. **Select “Stay logged out” and you'll see the screen shown in Figure 2-2.** (You can sign up if you like, but at this early stage it's not necessary.) At the bottom, you'll find the option to “Message ChatGPT.”
3. **Type your prompt into that field to instruct the chatbot on what you want it to generate.** (You'll find loads of information on prompts in Chapter 5.)

Getting started really is as simple as that, and congratulations to you if you tried it!

Consider creating an account so the chatbot will learn about your preferences for types of responses. (For example, is your writing conversational rather than formal?) This can be particularly beneficial if you decide to use the chatbot frequently, as it can provide more personalized and relevant responses.

## Trying AI for proofreading and editing

If you're curious about trying something new, give a chatbot a shot for proofreading and editing. I put an introduction to an executive summary into ChatGPT, intentionally adding errors to see how well it could correct them. And it passed with an A+.

**Prompt:** *Correct the following: In an air where health and well being are paramount, our mission is clear. Too nourish the minds and body's of our youngest citizens. Our granr proposal unvaes comprehenaive nutrition program tailored specifically for elementary school kids. Buy addressing he fundamental impor-tence of healthy eating habits, we aim to cultivate a generation of resilliant and thriving individuals. Throughout innovative inaitatives and community engagement, we see a future where every kid has aces to the nutrition foundation he/she needs to flourish in class and out of of class. We has the vision to champion this vital cause and shape a brighter healthiest tomorrow for these youngsters.*

The chatbot's response is shown in Figure 2-3 and you'll see that it not only corrected the (exaggerated) mistakes but also crafted a comprehensive and coherent message. Furthermore, it replaced the self-serving "we" with an inclusive invitation, urging the funder to "join us." Now that's impressive!

Here are some game-changing AI tools to try out for proofreading and editing:

- » **ChatGPT (<https://chatgpt.com>):** This is probably the most popular AI tool out there. Figure 2-3 shows how it can work wonders with your text.
- » **Grammarly (<https://app.grammarly.com>):** Delivers a complete score for the overall quality of the written work and includes recommendations for enhancing sentence structure, vocabulary, and tone.
- » **LanguageTool (<https://languagetool.org>):** An open-source AI tool that provides grammar, style, and spelling checks. It supports multiple languages and offers browser extensions for ease of use.

If you go online, you'll find many more. Play with a few. It's a fun and useful way to find the one you prefer while exploring their unique features and capabilities. When deciding which AI tool is right for you, try different ones because each has its own unique features, capabilities, and user experience. Some are free, and some charge a fee. Only by testing them can you determine which one (or ones) best meets your specific needs and preferences.



WARNING

While AI continues to make significant advancements, it's prone to making mistakes. Writer intelligence (WI), on the other hand, brings invaluable expertise and contextual understanding. Humans can pick up subtle errors, inconsistencies, transposed numbers, misspelled names, tone-related issues, and much more. (That's why I have my very own superhero — a real-live editor named Dan who makes me look good!). And always remember the importance of reviewing all AI-generated corrections to make sure the response aligns with your original intent and tone.

## Having varied information at your fingertips

It's worth noting that not all AI tools provide the same information. Their responses will vary depending on the datasets they've been trained on. To illustrate this, consider learning history from different teachers. Each teacher will present the historical context with slight differences and will highlight aspects that resonate with them.

Following are three examples of how AI tools came up with different information. I prompted each of them for a *bio on Sheryl Lindsell-Roberts*. Here's what each found:

» ChatGPT gave a general overview of my writing career without any specifics, as shown in Figure 2-4.

Sheryl Lindsell-Roberts is a seasoned author, communication expert, and educator, renowned for her profound impact in the realm of writing and business communication. Just remember that AI tools are susceptible to inconsistencies and inaccurate information. As you journey through this book, you'll come to appreciate the significance of WI.

- » **Ease of use:** Some tools are complex and use confusing steps and different templates to generate even the simplest pieces of content. Look for user-friendly interfaces and comprehensive tutorials.
- » **Type of content:** Consider the type of content you're looking to create. Different AI writing tools specialize in various kinds of content, so it's crucial to find one that fits your needs. Do you need a content generator, a summarizer, or a language translator (to name just a few functions)?
- » **Language model:** Choose an AI writing tool that uses the best language models. At the time of writing, systems such as ChatGPT that are powered by OpenAI GPT-4 are the most advanced, but others are closing in fast.
- » **Language used:** Make sure the AI writing tool you choose can understand and write in your writing style and language. Some AI tools write in English only, while others can write perfect copy in hundreds of commonly used languages.

- » **Original content:** Original content is vital. Make sure the AI writing tool you choose is capable of producing unique, original content.
- » **Pricing:** Although prices vary among providers (and many tools are free), evaluate the tool's features and capabilities to ensure it meets your specific needs and goals.



WARNING

*Caveat emptor* (buyer beware)! One of the quirks of AI is that without a little human wizardry, it can sometimes lead you astray. It might not always deliver spot-on data and could send you paddling into some murky waters. So, always play detective — double-check everything and keep your radar up for consistency and accuracy!

## Chapter 3

# Winning Hearts and Minds of Funders through Storytelling

**A**t its core, storytelling is about connections. It allows us to see the world from another perspective, stirring empathy and inspiring action. When you're seeking funding, storytelling can transform a grant proposal from a boring, dry document into a persuasive narrative that speaks to grant reviewers — appealing to their hearts and opening their wallets.

People have been sharing stories since the beginning of time. A cave painting found on an Indonesian island (dating back 45,000 years) is thought to be the earliest known record of storytelling. It depicts a pig and buffalo hunt, mythological figures in a hunting

scene. Hand gestures told stories before there were words. Thousands of years later Aesop's fables started capturing imaginations and still teach valuable lessons. From the early bards, to Middle-Ages troubadours, to chart-topping books and Hollywood blockbusters, we all enjoy a good story.

## Understanding Why Stories Make a Difference

When it comes to grant reviewers, understanding the human brain is key. The brain's inherent affinity for stories means that proposals containing compelling narratives are more likely to capture attention and leave a lasting impression. Rather than just presenting dry data and objectives, framing your grant proposal as a story — complete with a clear beginning, middle, and end — can help reviewers connect emotionally and intellectually with your project.

By weaving your goals, challenges, and potential impacts into a narrative, you make your proposal not only more engaging but also more memorable. This approach leverages the power of storytelling to make your case more persuasive and relatable, increasing your chances of a thumbs up.

Once the reviewers are engaged, take them on the journey with stories that grab attention, evoke their imagination, create empathy, link human experiences, change beliefs, maintain interest, and persuade.



REMEMBER

Each story should have a point to grasp and identify with. It's like painting a picture, something to visualize what happened at a particular time or place to people just like them. Every story should fit within the context of your grant proposal to support what you want your reviewer to think, feel, or learn.

## Using Prompts to Write Stories

You can feed an AI tool with prompts or specific details and it will spew out stories that can persuade and share your call to action, which is the “pot of gold.” Chapter 5 is your gateway to writing skillful prompts. Whether your intent is to persuade a grantor to fund your project or persuade a donor to fund your emerging business, you need to create a strong case. For example, your prompt may read:

*I'm applying for a grant. Create a compelling story about [details] that will tug at funder's heartstrings. Create fictitious names and places.*



SHERYL  
SAYS

Here's a great tip: Incorporating a story at the beginning of your proposal (and throughout as needed for emphasis) is a very powerful strategy for capturing the attention of the reviewers early on. You can create a memorable and impactful impression when you draw on real-life examples and anecdotes that highlight the project's relevance and potential.

In each of the following examples, I provided ChatGPT with factual prompts and the tone I wanted to create. The chatbot transformed these facts into poignant stories. It's worth noting that each of these proposals successfully secured the funding that was requested. (While the stories themselves didn't directly secure the funding, they undoubtedly played a crucial role in shaping a positive initial impression.)

An example of a grant for a community project:

**Prompt:** *In [city] a \$250,000 grant was used to transform a run-down 5-story building into a community center. 75 teens painted the walls with 10 colorful murals, there are 3 art workshops, and 2 music rooms. Upon completion, the teens participated in art projects, poetry slams, and theater performances drawing in over 100 people. It was a very positive experience for everyone. Make this story more interesting and limit it to two paragraphs.*

**AI's response:** *In [city], a group of 75 teenagers found hope and opportunity when a generous grant of \$250,000 transformed an abandoned 5-story building into a vibrant community center. Walls that were once cold and lifeless now adorn 10 colorful murals painted by some of the teens — a reflection of the creativity that now flourishes within. With 2 dance studios, 3 art workshops, and 2 music rooms at their disposal, these once-overlooked, troubled teens discovered their talents and found their voices.*

*Through art projects, poetry slams, and theater performances, these teens have captivated their community, drawing in an audience of over 100 people, and they're now participants in shaping their own futures. The funding not only repurposed a derelict building, but it lit a brighter future for these inner city teens, empowering them to strive and thrive.*

An example of a grant for medical research:

**Prompt:** *As a result of a prior grant, 300 patients participated in a program that allowed researchers to explore the complexities of coronary artery disease, heart failure, and arrhythmias. These 300 patients who once faced a bleak future now have reason to hope for a prolonged life. Bring more life to this story and tug at the reader's heartstrings. Make it brief.*

For 300 patients in this study, the last round of grant funding paved the way for ground-breaking medical research. ## Taking Reviewers on a Journey

Including stories in a grant proposal conveys the project's purpose and anticipated impact while building a compelling and emotionally engaging argument for funding. This immerses the reviewers in the journey of others which cultivates empathy, dismantles barriers, and challenges assumptions.



REMEMBER

A compelling grant narrative weaves together essential elements such as background information, project specifics, and personal anecdotes that vividly illustrate your passion and your mission. These stories should expand upon the following themes:

- » Highlighting the potential for long-term success and impact, as funders are more willing to invest in projects with a long-term perspective and scalability.
- » Demonstrating sustainability beyond the grant period and emphasize the importance of the program to the community, as well as the significance of evaluation to sustainability.

## EVERY STORY HAS A HERO

Invite the grantor to partner with you on a journey so they become heroes too. Start by painting a vivid picture.

- What are the problems your funding will solve?
- What difference have you made or can you make?
- How have you solved these problems in the past?
- How can their funding make the resolution possible?
- What's the sustainability of this venture?

Quantify data where applicable with numbers of people, percentages, dollars, and so on. They're a vital part of the story.

In the following example, I used AI to consolidate this story to include as the opening in the cover letter. (Check out Chapter 8 for more on creating impactful cover letters.) Notice how it includes *together we can*, making the reviewer part of the journey:

**Prompt:** *Add a powerful “together we can” to the story on how funding enabled researchers to pioneer groundbreaking medical advancements for 300 patients, leading to improved outcomes and life-prolonging therapies for coronary artery disease, heart failure, and arrhythmias.*

**AI's response:** *Grant funding has enabled researchers to pioneer groundbreaking medical advancements for 300 patients, leading to improved outcomes and life-prolonging therapies for coronary artery disease, heart failure, and arrhythmias. Together we can bring optimism and the simple joy of effortless breathing to thousands of people in need.*

## Creating Your Own Success Stories



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

By leveraging AI capabilities, you can present a more compelling and impactful case (via stories) to potential grantors. AI can assist with data analysis, personalization, visualization, and language enhancement making your stories come alive. Include in

your prompts words such as *highlight, conversational, lighthearted, heartfelt, emphasize, create a hook, give an analogy, express gratitude, or whatever is appropriate*. (Chapter 5 offers loads of tips for writing compelling prompts that get you the response you want.)

- » Begin by setting the stage with a powerful introduction that grabs the reviewer's attention and piques their interest.
- » Describe the project or initiative in vivid detail, emphasizing its unique qualities and the potential it holds for making a significant difference in the targeted area or community.
- » Use evocative language to create a sense of anticipation and excitement.
- » Artfully emphasize the groundbreaking aspects of your proposal.
- » Highlight the key features or components that set your project apart and make it a game-changer in its field. Whether it's a new approach to solving a pressing social issue, a breakthrough in scientific research, or an innovative program to support underserved communities, convey the significance of your project with unwavering confidence and enthusiasm.
- » Underscore the uniqueness and potential impact of your proposal.
- » Paint a vivid picture of the transformative force it represents, setting it apart from other initiatives and illustrating how it will redefine the landscape of its respective field.
- » Express your gratitude for the opportunity to introduce this groundbreaking project to the grantor.
- » Emphasize the potential for your initiative to seamlessly integrate into the fabric of the community or field, setting new standards for innovation, impact, and positive change.



REMEMBER

By conveying a sense of profound conviction and unwavering confidence in your proposal, you can build anticipation and imagery that resonates with potential grantors.

## Naming names

When showcasing the success of one or two people, avoid generic labels such as *the supervisor, the instructor, or the student*. Instead, include names, whether real or fictitious. (If you use real names,

be sure to get written permission first.) This creates an element of personalization and relatability. It also reinforces to the grant reviewer that behind every grant request lies a human story deserving of support and investment. Here's an example generated by AI for a person seeking funding:

**Prompt:** *Write a heartfelt story about Pete, a widowed father, working three jobs, who struggled to fund his daughter Yolanda's dream of becoming a doctor for their underserved community. With AI's help in finding grants and scholarships, Yolanda was able to pursue her medical education despite their financial hardships. Add something about "together we can."*

**AI's response:** *In the depths of Pete's struggle as a widowed father, working three jobs, his greatest concern was providing for his daughter, Yolanda, who had dreams of becoming a family doctor in a rural community that was in much need of medical services. ## Creating imaginary stories

If you don't have an actual story, create a realistic story to capture the reviewer's imagination. See how AI evokes imagination in the following example of seeking funding for research:

**Prompt:** *Create a compelling story about a world where technology and nature collide and how funding may lead to a medical breakthrough. Tack on something about "together we can. . ."*

**AI's response:** *Imagine a world where technology and nature collide, a group of researchers venture into an uncharted rainforest. As they explore, they find rare medicinal plants that could transform modern medicine and save lives. These plants may*

## Telling before and after stories



REMEMBER

Before and after stories play a crucial role in conveying the impact and necessity of the project. These stories serve as powerful tools for communicating the significance of the project and can effectively evoke emotions and create a sense of urgency. By effectively demonstrating the transformation brought about by the project, funders can better understand the tangible outcomes and the value of their support:

**Prompt:** *In the small rural community of Maplewood, lack of access to education, healthcare, and economic opportunities had trapped its residents in a cycle of poverty and despair. Children walked miles to the nearest school, families struggled to afford basic healthcare, and unemployment was rampant. The community lacked infrastructure, and hope seemed like a distant dream. Create a compelling story about how a grant provided medical care, established vocational training, and empowered adults to break the cycle of poverty. State this better and call out the impact.*

### AI's response:

*Thanks to the generous support of our donors, the landscape of Maplewood has been transformed. A new school has been built, providing quality education to the children who once walked for miles. A healthcare center now stands at the heart of the community, offering vital medical services to families in need. REMEMBER

Even stories that end in disappointment can be profound sources of wisdom. Before facing their outcomes, these narratives often teach us about the importance of preparation, resilience, and adaptability. Afterward, they offer valuable insights into overcoming failure, learning from mistakes, and growing stronger from adversity. The lessons gleaned from both the journey and the outcome shape our ability to handle future challenges with greater insight and empathy.

## Seeking volunteers' stories

A story in letter form from a volunteer can provide a personal, heartfelt perspective on the impact of the proposal. It showcases community support and commitment, which can significantly increase the chances of being funded. Here's an example:

**Prompt:** *Write an enthusiastic letter of testimony from a recipient who benefitted from funding for equipment for an after-school center. Add appropriate details that will strengthen the case. Make it somewhat formal, but not stuffy.*

### **Al's response:**

*Dear [Recipient's Name],*

## Preparing case studies

Case studies help illustrate real-world scenarios, develop problem-solving skills, and provide practical insights by analyzing specific examples and their outcomes. Think of case studies as the juicy anecdotes in a gripping novel — they add depth, relatability, and real-world impact to your grant proposal. When you weave a compelling case study into your proposal, you're essentially bringing your project to life. You're showing the funder, "This isn't just a theoretical idea; it's something that's already making a difference in people's lives." So, next time you're drafting

a grant proposal, don't forget to sprinkle in some captivating case studies.

## Embellishing Stories

Gandalf, a hero in J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Hobbit*, advised Bilbo Baggins that embellishing his tales upon returning from his adventure would make them more captivating. This advice resonates beyond literature; embellishment enhances storytelling across various artistic realms. Choreographers refine dance compositions by adding subtle gestures and movements to evoke emotion, while musical arrangers enrich scores with trills and passing tones without straying from the original melody. Similarly, movie scripts often take liberties with true events to heighten drama and audience connection (as seen in the fictional

characters of Jack and Rose in the movie *Titanic*, who humanized the historical tragedy).

In your own storytelling, incorporating embellishments such as metaphors, humor, or vivid details can transform a narrative from mundane to memorable. By focusing on conflict or any strong emotion or plotline, you can engage reviewers and evoke genuine emotional responses, leveraging creative freedom to craft narratives that resonate long after they're read or heard.

SAYS

I understand that suggesting embellishment may be controversial, but effectively drawing your reviewer into the story can enhance engagement. You can do it without sacrificing the story's authenticity by elaborating on the setting, characters, clothing, feelings, reactions, and more.

AI tools, such as those mentioned earlier in this chapter, can embellish stories by using detailed and specific prompts to extend and add more detail to sentences, role-play as a prompt generator for a specific AI tool, refine answers as more information is added, and compose sonnets, write code, get philosophical, and automate tasks. To prompt chatbots effectively, it's important to provide clear and concise language, include examples of what is or isn't expected, and specify the format or structure of the response (find out more in Chapter 5).

Additionally, providing context and specific details, such as tone of voice, style, and examples of interactions, can help elicit the desired type of response from chatbots. To embellish stories effectively, prompts should be specific and detailed. Some prompt ideas that can be used to generate story embellishments include:

- » Ask the chatbot to extend and add more detail to sentences, such as *Could you expand this story by adding more details and examples to make it more engaging and vivid?*
- » Prompt the chatbot to refine its answers as more and more information is added. Here's an example: *As I provide more information, continuously refine and adjust your responses to better fit the new details.*
- » Specify to the chatbot the format or structure of the response, such as asking for a short story or brief description. Here's a prompt for this: *Could you provide your response in the form of a short story or a brief description, depending on what best suits the content?*

## SHARING STORIES IN THE FIRST PERSON, PRESENT TENSE

Punctuate your story by telling it in the first person, present tense. This creates real-time immediacy, a sense of urgency. It gives the reader the feeling of plunging into the situation with you.

**Present tense (first person):** *As I walk onto the stage to make my presentation to the reviewing panel, I feel the anticipation in the air. Suddenly, there's a power failure. My mind races, trying to think of a quick solution.*

**Past tense (third person):** *Kate walked onto the stage confidently, but moments later there was a power failure that plunged the room into darkness. She stood bewildered, unsure of her next move.*

The present-tense scenario in first person amplifies the intensity. The reading or listening audience puts themselves in the shoes of that person, pondering, "What would I do?"

- » Provide context and specific details for the chatbot to use, such as tone of voice, style, and examples of interactions. Include words such as *fun, formal, first person, active voice*, and so on.

Using AI tools to enhance stories ensures consistency and creativity while maintaining the story's authenticity.



WARNING

Embellishing stories by adding fanciful details isn't lying, provided it's grounded in reality. But you must know where to draw the line between adding fanciful details and being dishonest.

## Preparing Strong Headlines That Tell a Story

Newspapers and magazines leverage impactful headlines to visually entice their readers. When you craft strong, compelling headlines, grant reviewers can quickly skim through your grant proposals and grasp essential information at a glance, even if they lack time to delve into the full document. Including pertinent

numbers further enhances the proposal's credibility. Here are several illustrative examples of informative and uninformative headlines:

**Informative headline:** *Empowering 10,000 Youths with Job Skills Training*

**Uninformative headline:** *Empowering Youths*

**Informative headline:** *Measurable outcome: Reducing carbon emissions by 20% in the first year through the implementation of energy-efficient systems in local schools.*

**Uninformative headline:** *Measurable outcome*

**Informative headline:** *Timeline: Constructing 5 new community centers within the next 18 months.*

**Uninformative headline:** *Timeline*



REMEMBER

A one-line story (such as a headline) can be a powerful storytelling tool, packing a punch of emotion, imagery, or intrigue into just a few words. When well crafted, this single line can leave a lasting impression and spark the reviewer's imagination.

If you need help generating headlines, turn to your favorite chat-bot for help (as I did for many headings throughout this book). Figure 3-1 shows a few informative headline examples from ChatGPT that tell a story.

Each of these one-liners hints at a larger narrative, inviting the grant reviewer to fill in the details and around the brief but evocative scenario. A good one-liner can be open to interpretation while still conveying a complete emotional arc or pivotal moment. Despite their brevity, these examples demonstrate how a single line can prompt the mind to imagine the rest of the story and drive your proposal to the top of the pile.

# Incorporating Visual Storytelling

In today's fast-paced world, mastering communication is essential. While words are powerful, adding savvy visuals acts like rocket boosters — elevating your message's impact. This is especially true for grant proposals, where well-designed visuals can simplify complex data and make your case more compelling and memorable to reviewers.

Picture this: You're diving into a grant proposal. It's a total text tsunami, drowning in details. Even the most dedicated reviewer might start seeing double, missing the gems hidden within. Now imagine the same proposal, but this time, it's sprinkled with a dash of diagrams, tables and charts. Suddenly, those complex concepts aren't so intimidating; they're enlightening and understandable.



REMEMBER

Graphics can unravel intricate processes, shine a spotlight on crucial connections, and serve up those brain-bending ideas on a silver platter of clarity and precision. Also, visuals don't play favorites with languages. They're the ultimate polyglots, breaking down barriers, boosting comprehension, and giving your proposal that extra oomph it needs to stand out from the crowd. So, when in doubt about clarity, let your visuals do the talking.

When skillfully integrated, graphics become an integral part of the visual storytelling process, guiding the reviewer through the proposal's journey and reinforcing key messages along the way. Graphics can elevate a grant proposal by visually communicating complex ideas and data in a clear, concise manner. Well-designed visuals act as powerful storytelling tools that reinforce key points and enhance the overall narrative, visually communicating complex ideas and data clearly and concisely.

To enhance your proposal, try out the following ideas:

- » Use diagrams and flowcharts to illustrate processes, methodologies, or project timelines in an easy-to-follow format.
- » Incorporate charts and graphs to present quantitative data, trends, or statistics in a visually compelling way.
- » Include maps, blueprints, or architectural renderings to provide spatial context for location-based projects.

- » Include a table to show the breakdown of the budget.
- » Include graphics in the executive summary when appropriate.

## Going beyond graphics

Think of visuals in the broader sense. Anything the reader sees is a *visual*, not just a graphic. Visual impact organizes information into manageable, bite-sized chunks of information, making it easy to read. It also emphasizes what's important by separating major points from minor points. Non-graphic visuals bring life to your content by strategically using white space, fonts, punchy lists, dynamic paragraph and sentence lengths, and captivating headlines. Therefore:

- » Leave 1" margins on the top, bottom, and sides.
- » Limit paragraphs to about eight lines of text.
- » Double space between paragraphs.
- » Limit sentences to no more than 20 words.
- » Include descriptive headlines and subheadings.

# Chapter 4

## Scoping the Proposal with a Kick-Start Brief

**B**efore diving into the grant proposal-writing process, it's crucial to get into the minds of the folks who'll be reading them — the grant reviewers. They start with the cover letter, which is like the proposal's first impression. If it piques their interest, they move on to the title page, then to the executive summary. (Unlock more about these topics in Part 3.) If they pass muster, the reviewer will give the rest of the proposal a closer look.

This is where a Kick-Start Brief steps in. It's your stealth tool for structuring and presenting your proposal. By following it you can develop a connection with the reviewers, help them understand why your project matters, and turn your ideas into a compelling case for funding.

## Kick-Starting Your Proposal

As an experienced grant proposal writer, I never commit one word to my computer until I've completed a *Kick-Start Brief*. This is a critical part of the proposal-writing process because it sets the foundation for a well-structured proposal. It ensures all stakeholders have a shared understanding and expectations are

aligned, which helps in streamlining the development process, avoiding misunderstandings and increasing the likelihood of successful outcomes. By addressing these before you start writing, you can identify potential challenges and resources needed, making the entire proposal more focused and actionable.



REMEMBER

The Kick-Start Brief is shown in Figure 4-1. Print it out and keep it handy. Use it as it appears or amend it to suit your proposal. Go ahead and fill out your answers to the questions it poses — simply dive in and get started! This not only saves you time and effort in the long-term but also increases the clarity and impact of your proposal, putting you in a stronger position to attract support and reach your goals more effectively.

When I introduce the Kick-Start Brief at my grant proposal-writing workshops, I often hear participants lament about their jam-packed schedules and wonder how they'll find the time to use it. But here's the twist: After giving it a whirl and drafting a chunk of their proposal during the workshop, they're usually amazed at how they ever managed without it. Many let me know later on about slashing their grant-writing time by 30 to 50 percent and snagging more funding to boot. Give it a go and see if you can achieve the same stellar results!

## Finding Nuggets in the Numbers with AI

The following sections look at each question on the Kick-Start Brief in more detail (the numbers match up to the questions in Figure 4-1).



Once you've answered the key questions posed on the Kick-Start Brief, just plug the information into your chatbot and watch the magic unfold. The chatbot can take your detailed input and turn it into a polished proposal with ease. For more on how AI can streamline this process and make your life easier, check out the details towards the end of this chapter.

### 1. What is the problem statement?

The *problem statement* forms the cornerstone of the entire proposal, defining the specific issue that the project seeks to address with funding. It should succinctly describe the problem's significance, scope, and potential consequences if left unresolved. This involves identifying key obstacles, such as limited access to nutritious food or high poverty rates that necessitate intervention.

To bolster credibility, the statement should reference relevant research, data, or community assessments that originally identified the problem's extent and causes. Additionally, it should emphasize the urgency of action by outlining the negative impacts on individuals, communities, or society as a whole by not addressing this problem. This approach underscores the need for funding to mitigate these consequences effectively. (You'll find an example of a problem statement in Chapter 12.)

## **2. Does this overlap another grant? What makes your request different?**

When considering the overlap with another grant, this can have implications for resource allocation, project coordination, and the overall impact of the proposed initiative. Be transparent about any potential overlap and clearly communicate how the current request differs from existing grants, if any. This may involve highlighting unique aspects of the proposed project, such as its innovative approach, specific target beneficiaries, or the distinct outcomes it aims to achieve.



WARNING

AI can help you identify overlaps in grant applications, but it's not always perfect. It might assist with text comparisons, database checks, plagiarism detection, and keyword matching — so always use your writer intelligence (WI) too.

## **3. What are your specific needs?**

In essence, following the needs not the money means developing the proposal based on identified community or organizational needs rather than tailoring it solely to match available funding opportunities or trends. It ensures that the proposed activities and goals are grounded in addressing real issues and achieving meaningful impact, rather than being driven primarily by financial considerations.

AI can address specific needs by analyzing data to identify key issues, generating insights and recommendations, and tailoring content to address the concerns of stakeholders. It helps streamline research, enhance clarity, and ensures that the proposal effectively targets and meets the identified needs.

## **4. What is your goal?**

Goals are like your North Star, helping you focus on the path towards achieving your purpose. Even though goals may not

have their own separate section in your proposal, they influence every aspect of the proposal, ensuring coherence and alignment throughout.

Here's a step-by-step process to help you craft a precise goal statement:

1. **Identify the specific SMART (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound) goal.** Begin by clearly defining the primary objective or outcome that you aim to achieve through the proposed project.
2. **Focus on impact.** Emphasize the intended impact or change that your project seeks to bring about. Consider the broader significance of your goal and how it aligns with the overarching mission or objectives of your organization.
3. **Be concise.** Keep your goal statement concise and to the point. Avoid unnecessary complexity or ambiguity by using clear and straightforward language that can be easily understood by reviewers. Always ask your chatbot to make your wording concise!
4. **Use action-oriented language.** Frame your goal statement using action-oriented language that conveys a sense of purpose and intentionality. Use verbs that denote action and progress, such as *to improve*, *to increase*, or *to reduce*. (Check out Chapter 5 to help prompt your way to success.)
5. **Include key components.** Ensure that your goal statement includes all key components necessary to convey the essence of your goal. This may include the target population or beneficiaries, the specific outcome or change you aim to achieve, and any relevant contextual information.
6. **Review and refine.** Once you have drafted your goal statement, review it carefully to ensure that it accurately reflects your intended goal and aligns with the overall focus of your proposal. Revise as needed to enhance clarity and precision. For example:

**Original goal:** *To improve access to healthcare services for underserved communities.*

**Refined goal:** *The goal is to increase access to primary healthcare services for low-income families in rural areas by establishing mobile clinics and community health outreach programs.*

## 5. What are your objectives?

*Objectives* encompass both short-term and long-term goals, each playing a crucial role in guiding the project's implementation and measuring its success:

- » **Short-term objectives** are achievable milestones that might involve immediate actions such as conducting a market analysis, piloting a product, or training staff for project implementation.
- » **Long-term objectives** focus on broader impacts such as expanding market reach, achieving significant revenue growth, or establishing a dominant position in the industry.

AI aids in setting long- and short-term objectives in a proposal by analyzing historical data to identify successful strategies and predicting outcomes for various objectives. ## 6. What are your budgetary needs?

Provide a detailed *budget* that breaks down all anticipated costs, including direct costs (such as personnel, materials, travel), indirect costs (overhead, facilities), and any equipment or other expenses. Ensure the budget aligns with the funding agency's requirements and limitations, such as restrictions on certain expense categories or caps on total funding. Be sure to

- » Explain and justify each budget line item, including how the costs were calculated. Provide supporting documentation where relevant.
- » Account for any required cost-sharing or matching funds from your organization.
- » Factor in applicable taxes, fringe benefits, and indirect/overhead costs, and get approval from your institution's grant administration office.

- » Present the budget in a clear, organized format, such as a spreadsheet or table, to make it easy for reviewers to understand.

## 7. What's the timeline?

A clear and realistic timeline is crucial for showing a project's feasibility and reassuring funders of effective resource use. A *timeline* outlines activities, milestones, and deadlines from start to finish, breaking the project into manageable phases. The timeline should also address task dependencies and potential risks, demonstrating careful planning and enhancing the proposal's credibility.

AI can assist by automating task scheduling, predicting potential delays, optimizing resources, and adjusting for changes.

## 8. What's the sustainability?



REMEMBER

Addressing sustainability is vital in any grant proposal as it shows a commitment to the project's long-term impact beyond the funding period. To ensure continuity, outline plans for securing additional resources, forming partnerships, and implementing measures for ongoing success. Securing extra funding can involve diversifying sources such as government grants, corporate sponsors, individual donors, or foundations. Proactive fundraising and financial management will enhance your ability to sustain the program. Building strategic partnerships with organizations, community groups, or government agencies can also boost sustainability by leveraging resources, expertise, and networks, offering additional funding, in-kind support, and volunteer assistance.

Consider strategies for scaling or replicating the program, such as documenting best practices, developing training materials, and providing technical support. Transitioning leadership to local stakeholders can further ensure the program's continued success and relevance by fostering community ownership and building local capacity.

Community outreach strategies might include hosting informational events, workshops, and networking opportunities to connect with key stakeholders and potential beneficiaries. Additionally, forming strategic partnerships with local organizations, businesses, and influencers can amplify the initiative's reach and impact, fostering a collaborative network of support and advocacy.

## 10. Who is your target population?



REMEMBER

Provide a clear and detailed description of the *target population* that includes demographic information such as age range, gender, ethnicity, income level, education, and any special needs or considerations. This demonstrates a nuanced understanding of the community or constituency you aim to serve and ensure that the proposed project aligns closely with their needs and priorities.

For example, if you're proposing a project aimed at improving healthcare access for low-income families in a specific neighborhood, define the target population by income level, family size, and health conditions. Include demographic data and account for cultural and linguistic diversity to ensure the interventions are responsive and accessible. This might involve offering services in multiple languages and incorporating cultural preferences into the program design.

## 11. What are the best practices?

*Best practices* are methods and techniques that are widely recognized as effective and efficient in creating, organizing, and presenting a grant proposal. They may include any of the following:

- » Stating the problem or need and provide data to demonstrate it.
- » Outlining specific, measurable objectives and a detailed project plan that aligns with your budget.
- » Demonstrating your organization's experience and qualifications to carry out the proposed project.
- » Explaining how you will sustain the project beyond the grant period and incorporate matching funds or other funding sources. Defining success metrics for your project, including both outputs and outcomes.

## 12. Who is your reader?

Grant proposals are screened electronically for completeness and eligibility and/or by experts in the relevant field. These reviewers assess proposals based on scientific merit, feasibility, impact, and alignment with funding goals. Decisions are made based on these evaluations and any additional priorities set by the funding agency. In some cases, there may be multiple stages of review, with different levels of scrutiny applied at each stage. Ultimately, decisions about funding are made based on the evaluations provided by these reviewers, along with any additional considerations or priorities set by the funding agency.

## 15. What's the one key point you want your readers to remember?

Crafting a compelling key point is crucial for making your proposal memorable and impactful. It's essential to ensure that your core message resonates with reviewers and sticks in their minds long after they've finished reading your proposal. It's like an

*earworm* (a song you hear that you can't get out of your head; it just keeps playing over and over).



REMEMBER

Here are some handy tips for creating effective key points:

- » Present your key point clearly and simply, avoiding jargon.
- » Ensure it aligns with the grant's objectives and priorities.
- » Highlight what sets your project apart, such as innovative approaches or proven success.
- » Emphasize the tangible benefits and outcomes of your project.
- » Create a memorable hook — such as a striking statistic or anecdote — that resonates with reviewers.
- » Reflect your mission and values to reinforce credibility and commitment.

# Chapter 5

## Turning Prompts into Gold

Crafting effective AI prompts is like mining for gold. Just as you need the right tools, technique, and a bit of patience to strike it rich, crafting prompts requires preparation, precision, and focus. Well-structured prompts minimize confusion, reduce the need for follow-up questions, and enhance the user experience. So, dig in and learn to write prompts that get you the gold (or in your case the golden, coveted funding.)

SAYS

A *prompt* is a specific input that's provided to an AI system to generate a desired output or response. In essence, it's AI-speak for posing a question. Throughout this book you'll see examples of prompts and the AI responses. They're in *italics* so you can recognize them easily.

This chapter shows you one of the key values of AI through writing prompts that not only get you the responses you need — but also make your chatbots think, “Wow, that’s a question I can’t resist answering!” Let’s dive in and turn your curiosity into pure proposal-writing gold!



REMEMBER

You may need to re-write a prompt multiple times to get the best possible results, but those iterations are key to refining your own skills and understanding. Soon, you’ll become a pro-prompter!

# Using Prompts as Your Proposal-Writing GPS

To write an effective prompt, you need to blend clarity with creativity, ensuring your requests are precise yet open enough to inspire engaging and useful responses. While you can get by with a simple “misspeling” or omit a question mark at the end of a question, try to be as accurate as you can.

Here’s how AI prompts can act as your GPS when writing a proposal:

- » **Enhancing creativity:** AI prompts can spark new ideas and directions for grant proposals. By suggesting alternative angles or methodologies, they can stimulate creative thinking among grant writers, leading to more innovative proposals.
- » **Improving efficiency:** Grant writing can be a time-consuming process, but AI prompts can help streamline it by generating relevant prompts, questions, or outlines tailored to the specific grant application. This can save valuable time for researchers and organizations, allowing them to focus on other aspects of the proposal.
- » **Providing quality assurance:** AI prompts can ensure that grant proposals address all necessary components and criteria. By prompting writers to consider various aspects such as project objectives, methodology, impact assessment, and budgeting, AI can help ensure that proposals are comprehensive and well rounded.

component of grant proposals (especially in scientific research or social science projects). By suggesting analytical approaches or highlighting key insights from data, AI can strengthen the evidential basis of grant proposals.

» **Supporting adaptability:** AI prompts can adapt to the evolving needs and priorities of grant writers. Whether it's refining the focus of the proposal, incorporating feedback from reviewers, or adjusting to changes in funding requirements, AI can provide ongoing support throughout the grant-writing process.

It's okay to abandon the good manners you were taught about saying "please" and "thank you." AI doesn't require niceties; it's all about results. But I asked ChatGPT what it thought about this:

**Prompt:** *Should I say please and thank you when I ask you for something?*

**AI's response:** *I probably shouldn't tell you this, but feel free to throw etiquette out the window when dealing with me. I don't need "please" or "thank you" to get the job done. But, just remember, even though I'm a bunch of code, I still appreciate a little politeness. It's like giving a high-five to a robot — no matter how many times you do it, it never gets old!*

## Crafting Your Proposal with Precise Prompts



WARNING

Not using precise prompts can lead to unclear or irrelevant responses, increased confusion, and the need for follow-up questions. It can also result in decreased accuracy, wasted resources, lower user satisfaction, missed opportunities, and ineffective communication.



SHERYL  
SAYS

I opened this section with a negative to emphasize the importance of precision and potential pitfalls. Using the negative in your proposals to emphasize something to be avoided can sharpen the focus on the undesired outcome, making the warning more striking and memorable.

Table 5-1 shows examples of AI prompts that serve as good starting points, helping you to structure your proposals and address key components required for successful grant proposals.

## Understanding the Capabilities and Limitations of AI Tools



WARNING

AI tools and chatbots have varying capabilities, so it's important to understand the strengths and limitations of the AI tool you're working with. For example, if the tool shines in generating creative narratives, you can design prompts that encourage storytelling to enhance documents such as grant proposals and bios.

On the other hand, if the AI tool is more adept at providing factual information, you can craft prompts that require the AI to research and present accurate data on a given topic. Check out Chapter 2 to see how chatbots responded differently to the same prompt.

The following sections highlight some of the key considerations to bear in mind to make your “conversations” efficient and productive.

## Chatting away

Chatbots are quite adaptable and can handle both spoken and written prompts effortlessly. It's a bit like chatting with a colleague. You can ask for clarifications, request a follow-up, steer the conversation in a different direction, dive deeper into a topic, or even ask to change the tone or the response.

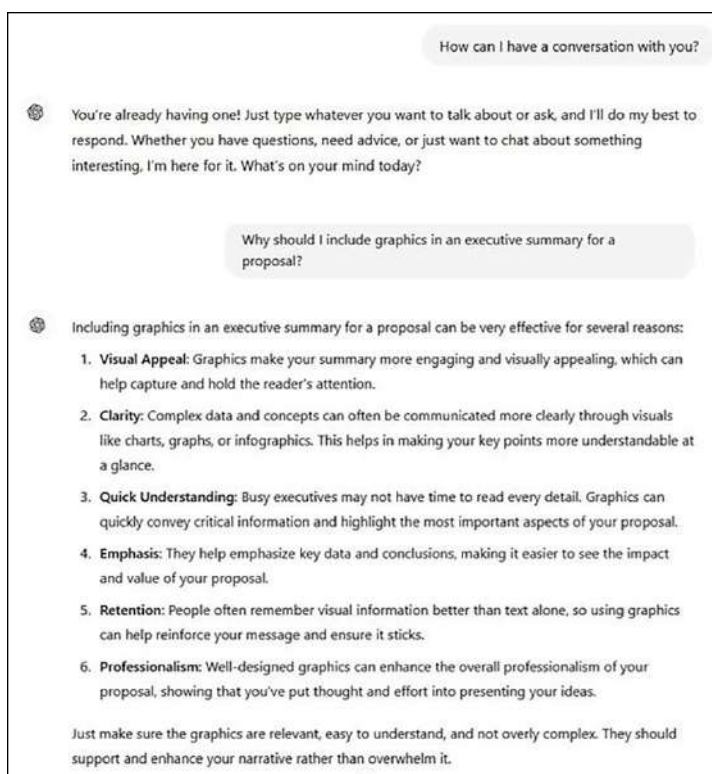


FIGURE 5-1: A conversation with ChatGPT.

As shown in Figure 5-1, I asked ChatGPT a question and it gave me a response. Then I followed up with another question, and it responded to that too. I was happy with both answers, so I ended the chat — although I could have continued it if needed. Chatbots have lots of patience.

## Asking for one single task at a time

Contrary to what we may think, humans aren't efficient multi-taskers. Our brains struggle with simultaneous task management, resulting in reduced productivity and more errors. AI shares a similar challenge with multitasking. It's more effective when you ask it one clear request at a time, allowing it to focus and deliver precise responses.



WARNING

Multiple requests in a single prompt can lead to confusion and hinder AI's ability to generate coherent responses, impacting the clarity and quality of the responses provided.

**Prompt lacking clarity:** *I need information on the benefits of exercise, different types of exercises, how to create a workout routine, and the best diet plan to follow.*

**Prompt with simplified single request:** *What are the benefits of exercise for overall health and well-being?*

## Finding the right length



WARNING

Prompt writing is like Goldilocks's porridge; either too hot or too cold. Avoid the too-short prompt or the epic saga. Find that just-right middle ground. If not, you might find yourself getting spirited responses such as the ones below that I received on two separate occasions. I don't remember what my prompts were, but I do remember AI's two sassy responses:

*Hey there, I'm all ears (figuratively speaking)! Could you toss a few more words my way so I can catch your drift? This prompt's a bit like a cryptic crossword without enough clues!*

*Whoa, Shakespeare! Your verbosity is giving me digital indigestion. Mind simplifying things a tad?*

## Providing specific guidelines and instructions

Provide specific guidelines such as word or page count, number of bullet points, formatting requirements, tone, or any

specific elements or themes. Here are some examples of well-written prompts:

*Write a persuasive 2-paragraph email to [name of client] who has shown an interest in purchasing [product] but can't commit because of budget constraints. List three purchase options.*

*Write a series of 3 emails to follow up on a post-purchase to make customers know they're valued.*

*Create an engaging two-paragraph introduction for an article on the pros and cons of [topic] starting with a pertinent analogy.*

*Compose a 500-word blog on [topic].*

## Asking open-ended questions

Asking AI open-ended questions unleashes creativity and imagination, allowing it to explore new ideas and concepts. This can lead to unexpected and fascinating outcomes, pushing the boundaries of what is known and venturing into new possibilities. Here are examples of open-ended prompts:

*How can I strengthen the "impact" section of my grant proposal to clearly articulate the potential outcomes and benefits of the project to both the funding organization and the broader community?*

*What are some innovative approaches to conducting literature reviews and citing relevant research in a grant proposal to demonstrate the project's feasibility and build a strong theoretical foundation?*

*Could you provide insights on incorporating stakeholder engagement and collaboration strategies into a grant proposal to demonstrate project sustainability and enhance its competitiveness for funding?*



REMEMBER

Close-ended questions, such as those requiring "yes" or "no" answers, are effective when you need specific answers, concise responses, or feedback that can be easily analyzed. They provide a focused approach to communication and can help you get the information you need efficiently.

## Using specific keywords or phrases

You can enhance AI's ability to generate more relevant ideas by incorporating specific keywords related to your industry, niche, or topic. (Learn more about this in Chapter 6.) As an example, if you're asking about dog breeds, include terms such as *breed*, *size*, *training*, and *temperament*. If you're talking about gardening, include keywords such as *organic*, *plants*, *soil*, or *fertilizer*.

Here are a couple of examples of prompts using some of these keywords:

*Share tips on how to create a thriving organic garden. Make it conversational.*

*Write an informative 500-word article about the best plants for beginners to grow in their garden. Provide essential care instructions.*

*Which large dogs are obedient and easy to train?*

## Indicating your desired tone

To indicate the tone, use descriptive words such as *friendly*, *enthusiastic*, *humorous*, *sympathetic*, *assertive*, *optimistic*, *cautious*, *professional*, *urgent*, *personalize*, *inspirational*, and so on. (Explore more about tone in Chapter 14.)

Here's an example of how to prompt a chatbot for the tone you want to project:

**Prompt:** *Please personalize this: The organization aims to achieve its goals through various innovative methods.*

**AI's response:** *Our organization is strongly committed to reaching our objectives using a wide range of creative techniques.*

## Encouraging research

When writing AI prompts that encourage research, give clear and specific instructions while leaving room for the AI to explore and generate its own ideas. For example:

*Explore the impact of climate change on marine ecosystems, considering both short-term and long-term effects.*

This prompt encourages the AI to research and provide a comprehensive analysis. Next, continue the conversation by asking AI to support its responses with evidence or examples. Remember to be patient, as this may be a reiterative process:

*Provide three examples of scientific studies or research papers that support your analysis on [topic].*

Here are a few other examples of prompts that allow AI the freedom to do its own research:

*Create an agenda for a meeting with my team. The meeting is about [insert meeting info]. Provide examples of what should be included in the agenda.*

*Conduct market research on consumer preferences for eco-friendly products. Provide insights on current trends. You can then re-prompt for information on consumer buying behavior.*

*Investigate sustainable energy solutions for reducing carbon emissions in urban areas.*

## Calling Upon Writer Intelligence



WARNING

Even with AI's assistance, you still need sharp writer intelligence (WI) to perfect a grant proposal. While AI can do lots of wonderful things, it sometimes provides inaccurate or misleading information. A skilled proposal writer brings essential human elements — such as compelling stories and tailored content that aligns with the funder's goals — to ensure clarity, engagement, and persuasiveness. This human touch addresses potential concerns and enhances the proposal's impact.

Thus, despite AI's valuable contributions, human finesse remains crucial and irreplaceable.

This way, both electronic scanners and human reviewers can see you're a great fit. Well, crafting a grant proposal is a lot like that. You need to use keywords that align with the funding agency's mission, goals, and evaluation criteria. These keywords help connect your project's objectives with what the funder is looking for.

*Keywords* act as microscopic beacons under a scrutinizing lens, guiding grant proposals through the intricate terrain of evaluation. Whether scrutinized by a meticulous human reviewer or analyzed by an electronic scanner, keywords function as vital markers that ensure visibility and distinction in the following ways:

- » For human reviewers, keywords help experts quickly understand your project's relevance and impact, making it stand out and sparking interest.
- » For electronic scanners, keywords are crucial for passing automated checks. They help ensure your proposal is detected and considered by algorithms that search for specific terms.



REMEMBER

Here's how keywords play a pivotal role in conveying the essence of your project, including its purpose, problem statement, proposed solution, and anticipated impact, thereby increasing the proposal's chances of success:

- » **Highlighting relevance:** They indicate to reviewers that the proposal addresses key aspects of the grant's objectives and priorities. Using relevant keywords ensures the proposal is aligned with the funding agency's goals.
- » **Enhancing searchability:** Keywords help funding agencies and reviewers quickly find proposals that match specific criteria or focus areas. This improves the visibility and accessibility of the proposal among potentially hundreds of submissions.
- » **Clarifying focus and impact:** Well-chosen keywords succinctly communicate the proposal's main themes, objectives, and expected outcomes. They provide clarity on what the project aims to achieve and how it contributes to broader goals.

- » **Demonstrating expertise:** Using appropriate keywords demonstrates the proposer's understanding of the subject matter and their ability to articulate its importance within the context of the grant's purpose. This reinforces credibility and expertise.
- » **Facilitating evaluation:** Reviewers often use keywords as initial filters or criteria to assess the relevance and potential impact of a proposal. Clear and compelling keywords can therefore influence the initial impression and subsequent evaluation of the proposal.



WARNING

Neglecting to include strategic keywords in your grant proposal can significantly jeopardize its chances of success. Without these critical markers, your proposal may easily get lost in the flood of submissions, overlooked by both human reviewers and electronic scanners.

## Adding the Value of AI

- » **Understanding patterns:** Studying many grant proposals to find common words and phrases that successful proposals often use. This helps it figure out which keywords are important for a particular type of grant.
- » **Extracting important words:** Picking out keywords from a grant proposal or related documents. These words usually describe the project's goals, methods, and expected results.

- » **Improving over time:** Suggesting keywords because it learns from feedback. As researchers and reviewers use it more, it learns which suggestions work best and adjusts its recommendations.
- » **Learning from feedback:** Learning from examples and feedback on past proposals to understand which words were effective in getting grants approved. It uses this knowledge to suggest similar words for new proposals.
- » **Checking for accuracy:** Ensuring that the words chosen are accurate and relevant to the topic of the grant proposal. It can flag words that might not fit well or suggest better alternatives.

## UNEARTHING SIGNIFICANT KEYWORDS

Here are some hints to finding just the right linguistic gems in addition to using AI:

- **Reviewing grant guidelines:** Look for words or phrases that are repeated frequently or emphasized, as these are likely key priorities for the funder and will be identified by the reviewers.
- **Identifying your target audience:** What are their needs, interests, and priorities? What are their goals, missions, and values?

What are the key terms and concepts that they use to describe their areas of focus and funding criteria? This information may be available on the website or in the Request for Proposal (RFP; see Chapter 11).

- **Using online tools and resources:** Learn what keywords and phrases are popular and relevant in the field and topic. Tap into search engines, databases, journals, websites, blogs, social media, and other sources to see what terms and phrases are frequently used and searched for by your peers and competitors.
- **Consulting experts:** Reach out to experts in your field for their insights on important keywords or terminology relevant to your proposal. This may be co-workers, influencers, journalists, or other recognized experts. They may provide valuable suggestions based on their experience and knowledge.

## Avoiding Keyword Overload

To ensure your grant proposal maintains its authenticity and avoids the pitfall of keyword overload, use AI to help identify synonyms or related terms. This not only prevents redundancy but also demonstrates a richer vocabulary and a deeper understanding of the topic.

Strive for a delicate balance between natural language flow and forced insertions. That means seamlessly weaving them into your narrative. Let the keywords serve as subtle signposts that enhance the clarity and coherence of your ideas, rather than imposing themselves as conspicuous distractions. Prioritize clarity, coherence, and sincerity in your writing, allowing the essence of your research vision to shine through organically.



REMEMBER

A well-crafted proposal resonates not just for its keywords, but for the depth of its insight and the passion behind its pursuit.

It was as if Sam had a co-pilot navigating, showing him ways to bypass traffic by using alternate routes.

With each suggestion from the chatbot, Sam felt his creativity reignite, much like the revitalizing effect of his morning espresso. It rejuvenated his energy and motivation, giving him the boost he needed to overcome writer's block and draft his grant proposal.

As he reviewed the draft, Sam couldn't help but feel grateful for the assistance of ChatGPT in navigating through the storm of grant writing, turning what felt like an insurmountable challenge into a manageable journey towards success.

## Writing a Draft with AI as Your Virtual Assistant

Using AI chatbots such as ChatGPT (<https://chatgpt.com>), Copilot (<https://copilot.microsoft.com>), HubSpot (<https://www.hubspot.com>), and others you can experience the marvel of AI technology mixed with your own writer intelligence (WI) to get your draft started and eliminate the dreaded writer's block.

Using AI for this purpose is like bouncing ideas off a specialist to get unstuck. Let's revisit Sam's writer's block to work through an example of this. The following is the prompt Sam created and typed into ChatGPT:

*Create a grant proposal for mental health services in the high school to include accessible support programs, counseling, therapy, and education. Also include a reasonable budget.*

Figures 7-1 and 7-2 show the two-page draft that ChatGPT generated. Remember that AI isn't perfect . . . you'll notice that the numbers were kind of wonky. But no worries, Sam made the corrections afterwards.

Each tool is slightly different, but there are certain fields you'll be asked to fill in when asking for a little bit of AI-generated help:

- » **Type of document:** Email, article, summary, press release, and so forth.
- » **Key points:** The main points you want addressed.
- » **Tone:** Formal, informal, joyful, sincere, sad, and so on.
- » **Length:** Number of words or pages.

# Sleuthing the Right Keywords with AI

Sam then asked ChatGPT to provide the keywords as he moved the proposal beyond the initial draft stage. (Learn more about keywords in Chapter 6.) Figure 7-4 shows what the chatbot produced.

1. **Mental Health Services:** Clearly state the focus of the program.
  2. **High School:** Specify the target population.
  3. **Prevention:** Emphasize the proactive nature of the program.
  4. **Early Intervention:** Highlight the importance of addressing mental health issues early.
  5. **Well-being:** Stress the goal of promoting overall mental well-being.
  6. **Crisis Management:** Indicate readiness to address urgent mental health needs.
  7. **Counseling:** Mention the availability of professional counseling services.
  8. **Peer Support:** Include any peer support programs that may be part of the initiative.
  9. **Education and Awareness:** Signal efforts to educate students and staff about mental health.
  10. **Stigma Reduction:** If applicable, discuss strategies for reducing the stigma around mental health.
  11. **Community Partnerships:** Highlight collaborations with local mental health organizations or professionals.
  12. **Data-Driven:** Indicate that the program's effectiveness will be measured using data.
  13. **Evidence-Based Practices:** Mention any interventions or approaches that are evidence-based.
  14. **Sustainability:** Discuss plans for the program's long-term sustainability.
  15. **Equity and Access:** Emphasize the importance of providing equitable access to mental health services for all students.

## REPURPOSING EXISTING CONTENT

Repurposing existing content in the context of proposals means strategically using previously created material to enhance the quality and efficiency of your proposal-writing process. By repurposing content from past proposals, presentations, case studies, marketing materials, or proposals that were previously successful, you can save valuable time and resources while maintaining consistency in messaging and branding. This allows you to focus more on crafting compelling

narratives and strategic insights tailored to specific client needs, thereby increasing productivity and improving the overall impact of your proposals.

AI tools can scan and analyze previous materials to identify sections that are relevant to your current proposal. However, it's essential to ensure that all reused content is relevant, updated as necessary, and properly credited to maintain integrity and transparency.

## Polishing the Draft by Pairing WI and AI

Enough about Sam . . . Let's level up from creating your own draft to crafting your polished proposal that not only captures your vision but dazzles the grant reviewer with its clarity and persuasiveness.

### Buffing it up with WI

Once AI has helped you create a basic draft, you need to add WI's human touch. (Tap into why this is so important by reading Chapter 1).



REMEMBER

As a proposal writer, there are some crucial considerations that demand your attention — areas where AI can't offer insight or judgment:

- » **Will the cover letter wow the reviewer?** This is the first impression that will determine whether they discard your proposal or continue reading. (Chapter 8 is chock-full of tips.)
- » **Do the headlines give key information at a glance?** If headlines and subheads don't jump out with key information, revise them. (Chapter 3 fills you in on writing pop-out headlines.)
- » **Is there a strong problem statement?** Without a strong problem statement that clearly defines the issue and its significance, your proposal will lack focus, and reviewers may have difficulty seeing the relevance of your project. (Learn more about creating a problem statement in Chapter 4.)

- » **Did I use paragraphs appropriately?** Limit paragraphs to eight lines of text. If paragraphs are too long, people may not read them. If they're too short, your message may seem disjointed.
- » **Are keywords sprinkled throughout?** This will enhance the proposal's visibility and relevance, ensuring it aligns with search criteria and increases the likelihood of attracting attention from targeted reviewers or evaluators. (Chapter 6 gives details on how AI can help you find keywords.)
- » **Is the tone correct?** The language and style should align with the values and expectations of the funding organization while maintaining clarity and professionalism. (Learn about using the proper tone in Chapter 14.)
- » **Did I give too much or too little information?** Provide the needed information to ensure clarity, relevance, and optimal engagement without overwhelming or underwhelming the reviewers.
- » **Are there adequate transitions?** Used sparingly, transitions such as *moreover*, *however*, and *therefore* between ideas can help the reviewer keep track of how your arguments are related to one another.
- » **Did I include critical stories?** Remember that stories forge human connections by engaging emotions and creating empathy, thereby swaying the grantor to allocate the funds you request. (Creating winning stories is detailed in Chapter 3.)
- » **Did I add testimonials?** These serve as social proof by validating the credibility and effectiveness of your proposed solution through real-world experiences and feedback from satisfied stakeholders or users.

## Proofreading and editing with AI

Harness the power of AI to meticulously proofread and edit every section of your proposal, from the captivating front matter that hooks the reviewer to the detailed back matter that adds depth and credibility.

AI tools excel in catching grammar and punctuation errors, ensuring consistency in style and formatting, and even offering suggestions for clearer phrasing and more impactful language. Tools include Grammarly (<https://app.grammarly.com>), QuillBot (<https://quillbot.com/online-proofreader>), and Trinko (<https://www.trinka.ai/free-proofreading-tools>). However, chatbots also proofread and edit their own output.

## Readying Your Proposal for Submission

Readying your proposal for submission is like baking a cake. You know it's ready when all the ingredients have been carefully measured and mixed, the batter is smooth and consistent, and it's been baked to perfection. Just as a cake needs to be delicious, well decorated, and meet the expectations of those who will enjoy it, a proposal needs to be polished, persuasive, and meet all the required guidelines.



REMEMBER

If you've used AI as an assistant to get you this far, humans alone are critical at this point. They bring contextual understanding, nuanced judgment, and creativity that AI can't provide. Only humans can ensure that the final output aligns with specific goals, addresses subtleties, and resonates effectively with the reviewers.



WARNING

Never power up your computer and shut down your brain — let AI keep your mind in gear rather than doing the driving.

A compelling cover letter in a grant proposal is like crafting the perfect dish for a prestigious culinary competition. Just as each ingredient must blend to create an outstanding flavor, your cover letter must blend seamlessly to captivate the senses of the funding organization. It's not merely about making a good initial impression but about crafting a culinary masterpiece that will leave a lasting taste on the palate of the potential funder.

Much like how a chef carefully selects the freshest ingredients, you must choose your words with precision, ensuring they resonate with the values and goals of the funding organization while authentically representing your mission and vision. And just as a skilled chef infuses their dish with passion and creativity, infuse your cover letter with the essence of your project's purpose and potential impact.

So, whether you're crafting a culinary masterpiece or a cover letter, remember the significance is not just the first impression, but the *right* first impression. Just as a well-prepared dish can win over the toughest of food critics, a well-crafted cover letter can secure the support needed to turn your vision into reality.



REMEMBER

Despite its name, a cover letter isn't always a letter in the traditional sense. It can also be an email or electronic letter accompanying an online proposal submission.

## Prioritizing the Reader's Perspective



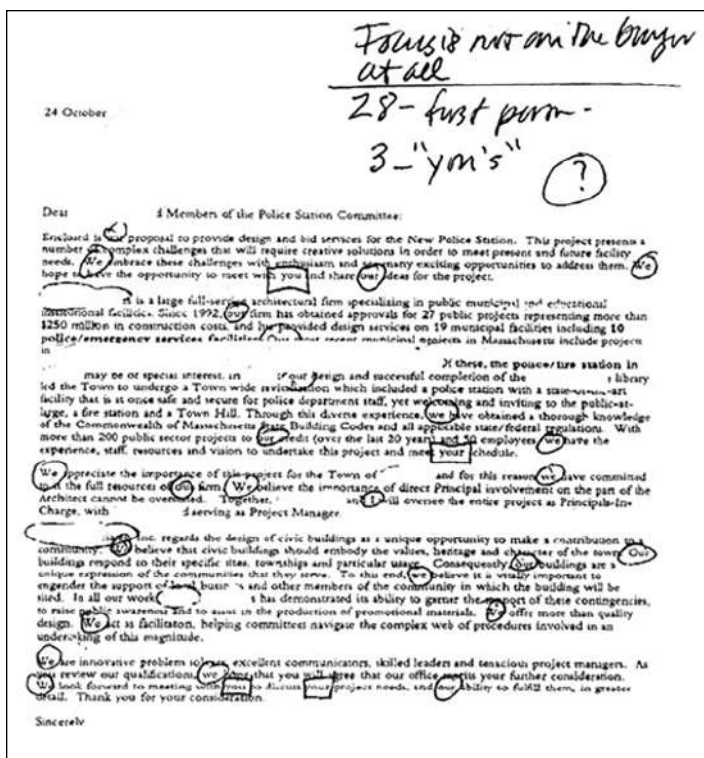

To illustrate the importance of the cover letter and how it can prioritize the reader's perspective, take a look at Figure 8-1, which showcases a letter received by one of my clients, an architectural firm. They had issued a Request for Proposal (RFP; find out more about these in Chapter 11), for a multi-million-dollar contract. The cover letter squelched any chances of this submitter getting the contract. As a matter of fact, my client never even read the proposal. Here's why: The sender mentioned themselves a staggering 28 times, while mentioning my client a mere three times. Then my client proudly announced, "And you know what I did? I responded to them with the following: 28 to 3 — you lose!"



REMEMBER

This scenario drives home the point of making the reader your priority. Use *you*, *your*, *we*, and *our* as much as you can to bring the reader (in this case funder) into focus.

- » **Content suggestions:** Analyzes successful proposals and cover letters to offer insights and suggestions for including relevant points based on your project's goals and impact.
- » **Language enhancement:** Refines the clarity, coherence, and professionalism of your cover letter, suggesting

alternative phrasing for greater impact. (See Chapter 14 for tone and language tips.)

- » **Grammar and syntax:** Ensures your cover letter is free from grammatical and spelling errors, enhancing its overall impression.
- » **Personalization:** Tailors the cover letter with specific details about the organization, project, and outcomes, aligning with grant requirements.
- » **Formatting assistance:** Formats the cover letter according to grant guidelines, including spacing, font styles, and layout.
- » **Tone and voice:** Maintains a consistent tone and voice, aligning with your organization's values and objectives.
- » **Review and feedback:** Offers instant feedback and suggestions for improving the cover letter's effectiveness.
- » **Proofreading and editing:** Helps eliminate text errors that could lead to rejection.

As valuable as AI tools may be, remember that writer intelligence (WI) is critical. AI should be used as a complement to your creativity and critical thinking, rather than a replacement.

## Including the “Write” Stuff

Whether you're sending your proposal online, via email, or by hard copy, your cover letter should look something like the one you see in Figure 8-2. And your cover letter should be prepared on a letterhead sheet (not shown in the figure).

The following sections guide you through the different elements of a well-written cover letter, showing you what to include.

## Capturing hearts and opening wallets

The cover letter sets the stage for your grant request and can significantly influence the funder's perception of your organization and project. Here are my top tips for what to include in an effective cover letter:



REMEMBER

- » **Introduction:** This provides an overview of who you are, what you do, and why you're seeking funding. This helps funders quickly understand the context of your proposal before delving into the details.
- » **Personalization:** Personalize your proposal for the specific funder you're targeting. You can tailor your message to address the funder's interests, goals, and priorities, demonstrating that you've done your research and understand their needs. Also, if you've had previous (favorable) contact with the grant provider, mention that.

Personalized communication can make a significant difference in how your grant proposal is received. Taking the time to address it to the right person says more than what's written. It demonstrates your attention to detail and your genuine interest in partnering for the grant opportunity.

- » **Relationship building:** Start building a relationship with the funder. Express your appreciation for their work, demonstrate your enthusiasm for the opportunity to collaborate, and convey your commitment to achieving mutual goals.
- » **Clarity and conciseness:** The text must be clear, concise, and to the point. It should effectively communicate the purpose of your proposal, the impact you aim to achieve, and why the funder should consider supporting your project. This clarity helps ensure that your proposal gets the attention it deserves.
- » **Call to action (CTA):** Ending with a CTA, saying exactly what you expect the funder to do, invites them to review your attached proposal or inviting further discussion. This encourages the funder to take the next step and engage with your proposal, increasing the likelihood of a positive response. The CTA can be offering to clarify any issues, requesting a meeting, or thanking them for considering partnering with you.

## Grabbing attention with a captivating opening paragraph

Start your letter with something that will captivate attention: A bold question. A shocking statistic. A statement. A story of a specific person or situation that your project has helped. This gives the reader a glimpse into your world and reminds them why your mission is important. Appeal to their hearts by giving specific details which tie directly into the project's goals and the funder's interests.

Here's an example of how AI can help to captivate a funder:

**Prompt:** *In a few sentences tell about how hundreds of children in our community go to bed hungry and what we can do together to change that. Use a tone that tugs at heartstrings.*

**AI's response:** *Every day, hundreds of children in our own community go to bed hungry. Together we can provide nutritious meals to these vulnerable children and give them a chance for a brighter future. Imagine the joy in a child's eyes as they receive a warm meal, knowing that someone cares enough to make a difference in their lives.*

## Using a proper salutation and closing

Be aware of professional boundaries. The salutations and closing should align with the purpose and tone of your letter, your relationship and familiarity with the recipient, the culture and expectations of the recipient, and the consistency and clarity of your message. By providing the correct tone, you're setting a formal or informal tone that will carry through your letter. (Find out more about tone in Chapter 14.)

### Saying hello

Salutations are important because they set the mood and determine the attitude your reviewer should adopt when responding. It's like saying hello to someone who walks into a room or calls you on the phone.



REMEMBER

Always start with *Dear [Name]* (even though the person probably isn't dear to you). If you're writing to someone you don't know well (which is probably the case with proposals), use *Dear Mr., Mrs., Ms., or Dr.* and the last name, followed by a colon. If you call the person by their first name (which is rare in the case of proposals), end with a comma. If you're unsure of the person's gender, use the first and last name followed by a colon:

» **Formal:** *Dear Mr. Gentry:*

» **Informal:** *Dear Leslie,*

» **Unsure of gender:** *Dear Pat Smith:*



WARNING

Never use generic salutations such as *To Whom it May Concern* or *Dear Sir or Madam*. They're cold and impersonal. When you personalize your letter by addressing it to a specific person, you increase the chances of your letter being read and taken seriously.

## Bidding adieu

A complimentary closing ends the letter with a professional touch. It demonstrates that you're adhering to standard communication etiquette. Just as you wouldn't ignore a hello when entering a room or calling on the phone, you wouldn't end a conversation without a proper goodbye:

» **Formal:** *Respectfully, Sincerely, Most sincerely.*

» **Informal:** *Best regards, Cordially, With appreciation.*

The closing doesn't end there. It's the beginning of a block of information that has the name of the sender and the person's title that can be expressed in either of the following ways. Be sure to leave enough room for the signature.

*Sincerely yours,*

## Ending with a postscript

Did you know that a postscript may be the most often read part of the cover letter? It stands apart from the body and grabs the recipient's eye. Use the postscript to emphasize collaboration and the importance of the recipient's involvement in the project:

In Figure 8-2, I prompted ChatGPT as follows: *Write a postscript to end the letter dramatically.* See how the chatbot nailed it!



REMEMBER

You don't need to add a "P.S." notation; the postscript is obvious without it. And if you handwrite it or use a script font, it will be even more powerful.

## Chapter 9

# Amplifying the Impact of the Title Page

**A**ssessing the title page of your proposal is like judging a book by its cover. We all do it! Although not heavy on content, the title page carries lots of weight. It's the first "hello" reviewers get after your cover letter — often just a quick glance. But it sets the tone for the rest of the proposal. A tidy, error-free title page isn't just eye candy; it's a billboard for your professionalism. It can sway what reviewers think of your proposal even before they dive into the meaty bits, just like the cover of a book.

## Knowing the Value of a Well-Chosen Title

Consider the transformative journey of two iconic literary works: *Men Are From Mars, Women Are From Venus* and the *Chicken Soup* series. Originally, these titles were but mere whispers in the vast

cacophony of publishing, carrying the weight of their content but lacking the magnetic pull that would launch them into the stratosphere of success.

John Gray's seminal work on relationships was originally titled *Men, Women and Relationships*. Yet, it was the celestial imagery and gendered metaphor of *Men Are From Mars, Women Are From Venus* (HarperCollins, 1992) that catapulted Gray's book into the collective consciousness, resonating with readers worldwide and sparking a cultural phenomenon.

Similarly, the *Chicken Soup* series, compiled by Jack Canfield and Mark Victor Hansen, began its journey with a less-than-remarkable title: *Heartwarming Stories for the Soul*. While descriptive, it lacked the zing needed to capture the imagination of readers. It wasn't until the evocative simplicity of *Chicken Soup for the Soul* (Simon & Schuster, 1992) graced the covers that the series took flight, becoming a staple on bookshelves and inspiring countless readers with its nourishing tales of hope and resilience.

These are just two poignant reminders of the transformative power of a well-chosen title, and that the nuances of language, imagery, and emotion can turn a mundane title into a grant-proposal masterpiece.

As I was writing this chapter, I couldn't help but journey back to my early days as a workshop facilitator. I had put together a workshop titled, "Business and Technical Writing for Excellence." This fell flatter than a deflated balloon. Shortly thereafter I attended a professional networking event, where minds mingled and creativity crackled in the air. We set aside time to brainstorm, to muse and ponder perfect monikers. Lo and behold, amidst the whirlwind of ideas, a stroke of brilliance came to me.

There it was, gleaming like a beacon of linguistic delight: "Write It So They'll Read It™." Suddenly, a title that was once flat was transformed into something vibrant and dynamic, akin to a fully inflated balloon floating high in the sky. It was bursting with potential,

excitement, and possibilities, and — with this energized title — the workshop soared (and continues to soar) to new heights. Oh, the power of a well-crafted title!

AI wasn't around then. But just for fun, I recently brainstormed with my favorite chatbot and asked it to generate titles for a workshop on business and technical writing:

**Prompt:** *Write 6 titles for a workshop on business writing and technical writing. Make them engaging.*

**AI's response:**

- *Write to Thrive: Bridging Business and Tech*
- *Crafting Clarity: The Art of Business Communication*
- *Wordsmiths Unite: Mastering Business & Technical Writing*
- *Ink & Algorithms: Navigating the Intersection of Business and Tech Writing*
- *The Power Pen: Transforming Ideas into Effective Business Communications*
- *From Code to Comprehension: Elevating Business Communication in the Tech Age*

They're good, but my title is where the magic happens and I'm sticking with it!

## Getting Title-Page Help from AI

An informative title can summarize the entire proposal in one phrase. It's a big job, and a vital one. AI can streamline the process of title selection by offering a diverse range of options, refining language, and considering the needs and preferences of the intended audience. Here are some of the benefits of using AI to come up with a title:

- » **Generating options:** AI can quickly generate numerous title options based on the provided topic or keywords. This saves time and provides a pool of choices to consider using as a starting point.

- » **Offering variety and creativity:** AI can produce titles that encompass different angles, themes, or aspects of the proposal. It can offer a range of creative ideas that might not have been initially considered. (Dive into Chapter 1 to learn more about what chatbots are available. Try a few because they will each give different results.)
- » **Polishing language:** AI can refine titles by ensuring they're grammatically correct, concise, and engaging. It can suggest improvements to make the titles more appealing and professional.
- » **Considering the audience:** AI can analyze the target audience and tailor titles accordingly. It can adjust language, tone, and style to resonate with the specific audience, whether it's academic reviewers, funding organizations, or the general public. (Chapter 4 is your gateway to knowing all you can about your learners.)
- » **Incorporating feedback:** If the AI you're using has access to feedback or data on previously successful grant proposals, it can use this information to generate titles that align with patterns of success.
- » **Using keyword optimization:** AI can help ensure that titles contain relevant keywords or phrases that are likely to catch the attention of reviewers or funding bodies. This can improve the visibility and relevance of the proposal, especially for those that are reviewed online. (See Chapter 6 for tidbits on finding just the right keywords.)

In Figures 9-1 and 9-2 you see two examples of title suggestions generated by AI. Here are the prompts that generated those responses:

**Prompt for Figure 9-1:** *Give me 5 grant proposal titles for an after-school program for elementary students. Make it appeal to grant reviewers.*

**Prompt for Figure 9-2:** *List 5 titles for a research project to get rid of snoring.*

## Crafting an Eye-Catching Visual Identity

As mentioned at the start of this chapter, we do judge books by their covers — and the same goes for grant proposals.

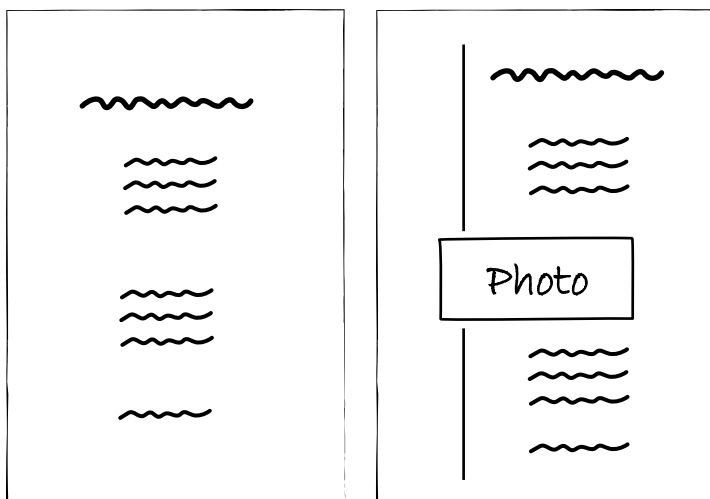
An appealing title-page design can set your proposal apart in a sea of competitors. You can be as creative as you'd like with your proposal cover page so long as it's professional and industry-appropriate. The design should be appealing to the reviewer, while also being functional by building on the proposal's theme.

By leveraging AI for a cover design, you can save time, explore creative options, and ensure your proposal stands out visually to make a strong impression. You don't need to be a graphic designer: The title page can be plain and simple — such as the ideas shown in Figure 9-3 — so long as it is impactful and effective. But if you want to try a little more creativity, Chapter 3 leads you to some visual AI tools.

## Knowing What to Include



REMEMBER

It's important to adhere to any specific formatting requirements or instructions provided by the funding agency. If there aren't any special instructions, here's a good list to follow:

- » **Title of the proposal:** Clearly state the title of your project. It should be concise, descriptive, and original (and yes, as outlined earlier in this chapter, AI can help here).
- » **Name of your organization:** Provide the name of your organization or institution.
- » **Date:** Include the date the proposal is being submitted.
- » **Contact information:** Provide contact details such as project director, the address, phone number, email, and website of your organization.
- » **Funding agency:** Mention the name of the funding agency to whom the proposal is being submitted. (Tip: Make their name and/or logo larger than yours.)

» **Any other relevant information:** Depending on the specific guidelines provided by the funding agency, you may need to include additional information such as grant identification numbers, project periods, or funding amounts.

## Proofreading Very Carefully (or Suffering the Consequences)



WARNING

Never underestimate the power of proofreading when it comes to your title page. One tiny typo might not seem like a big deal, but it could send a negative message to funders — and the loss of your credibility. Double-check everything. Check the accuracy of the information. Check the formatting and layout. Check the clarity and readability. Check against the grant requirements. Check everything! And it's always good to have a fresh pair of (human) eyes take a look — so ask a trusted colleague.

Here's what happens when you don't proofread carefully: During one of my writing workshops, Amanda, a diligent reviewer for grant proposals at Emory University, shared a telling story. She recounted how she was engrossed in reviewing submissions for a significant research project. One particular proposal caught her attention. However, her excitement quickly waned as she scanned the title page and spotted a glaring error — the university's name was misspelled as “Emery” rather than “Emory.” Amanda felt that the error indicated a lack of attention to detail, a flaw that could potentially cascade through various phases of the research project. Despite the proposal's potential for harboring groundbreaking ideas, Amanda made the decision to stamp it “Rejected.”

# Chapter 10

**T**hink of an executive summary like an enticing movie trailer. It provides a tantalizing glimpse of what's to come, highlighting the most compelling aspects in a concise and captivating manner. Just as a movie trailer leaves viewers eager to see the full story unfold on the big screen, a well-crafted executive summary leaves grant reviewers eager to delve deeper into the proposal to uncover all the details and insights it promises. Both aim to grab attention, generate excitement, and leave a lasting impression that compel further engagement.

A killer executive summary gives your proposal a sparkling intro that screams, "Pick me! I'm worth your time!" This can be the difference between your proposal being enthusiastically embraced or lost in the abyss of overlooked proposals. Along with the cover letter (detailed in Chapter 8) and the title page (read more on this in Chapter 9) it serves as the inaugural handshake, setting the stage for the entire proposal.



REMEMBER

In a landscape where time is precious, the executive summary emerges as a time-saving marvel, condensing the essence of the project into a concise narrative. Its strategic significance can't be overstated. It's the platform to showcase the brilliance of your project's vision, objectives, and methodologies.

## Recognizing the Allure of the “Appetizer”

Think of this appetizer as setting the stage for the meal to come, making your mouth water in anticipation. You bite into a flawlessly crafted bruschetta — the crunch of the bread, the explosion of fresh tomato, the subtle dance of garlic and basil on your taste buds. With each bite, your anticipation for the main course grows.



REMEMBER

Your executive summary should be the delectable appetizer that leaves the reviewer waiting in anticipation for your main course — the full proposal. In it, be sure to

- » Clearly state the purpose of your proposal.
- » Summarize the main points.
- » Describe any results, conclusions, or recommendations presented in the full proposal.
- » Provide enough information for reviewers to understand the content of the full proposal without having to read it in its entirety.

During my workshops I'm often asked this question: “Am I allowed to use a chart, table, or graphic in an executive summary?” My answer is Yes. Yes. And Yes. If this will condense critical information and present it at a glance, that's not only allowable, but encouraged. (You'll see an example of this in Figure 10-3, later in this chapter.)

Opening with an inspiring story or a compelling statistic can make your message even more impactful. Just be sure that your

statistic is up to date, and double-check the accuracy of anything AI generates. (For more on using stories effectively, check out Chapter 3.)

## Understanding the Value of an Executive Summary

With persuasive prowess, the executive summary can convince reviewers of the project's worthiness, leaving an indelible mark in their minds. It's not just a perfunctory component to the overall proposal, but rather the cornerstone of its success, wielding the power to captivate, persuade, and secure the coveted funding.

Imagine busy reviewers, their days a blur of meetings, emails, and urgent tasks, scarcely finding a spare moment to catch their breath, let alone wade through the depths of lengthy proposals. The executive summary is the arsenal of every savvy proposal. It's akin to a superhero's cape, swooping in to rescue time-strapped decision makers by encapsulating all the essential details within just a few succinct pages. Some reviewers will read nothing more than this before passing it to the next level. Make it count!



REMEMBER

If you truly want to captivate busy reviewers, you need more than just a typical summary. You need an action-packed masterpiece. That's where Chapter 4's Kick-Start Brief comes into play. It's your key to unlocking vital insights about your reviewer, empowering you to tailor your summary to perfection. So, take heed and harness the power of this tool. Trust me, it's your golden ticket to seizing the pot of gold.

## Writing your Executive Summary Post-Proposal

Just as you wouldn't attempt to write a book report without first delving into its content, crafting an effective executive summary requires a thorough understanding of the proposal. The essence of an executive summary is to distill the core points and overarching message from a more detailed document, so craft it once the rest

of your proposal is written. AI can significantly help to streamline the process. A simple prompt for this may read:

*Create a powerful and engaging 3-page executive summary of the following proposal: [full text]*

## Picking Up Tips and Tricks

Crafting an effective executive summary requires skillful synthesis and distilling key insights into a concise format. This section explores invaluable tips and tricks for mastering the essential art of summarization.

### Keeping it to the proper length

If you're responding to a Request for Proposal (RFP; see Chapter 11), follow those guidelines. If not, here are some general guidelines to use:

- » If the document is about 50 pages, the summary should be one or two pages.
- » If the document is between 50 and 100 pages, consider an executive summary of two or three pages.
- » If the document is longer than 100 pages, a three- or four-page summary is appropriate.



WARNING

Failing to adhere strictly to the length described in the funder's guidelines could jeopardize your proposal.

## Peppering with keywords

Including keywords in the executive summary is crucial for ensuring that it gets noticed and properly evaluated by the reviewers (which can be a human or an electronic scanner). *Keywords* are specific terms or phrases that highlight the key aspects of your proposed project, such as its goals, target population, methodologies, and expected outcomes. (Learn more in Chapter 6 about how AI can assist with finding keywords.)



REMEMBER

Strategically incorporating keywords throughout the proposal helps demonstrate alignment with the funder's priorities and evaluation criteria. This increases the likelihood that your proposal will be accurately matched with the appropriate reviewers and given full consideration.

## Using technical terms cautiously



REMEMBER

Use technical terms only when you're sure the reviewers reading the report are familiar with them. Not all reviewers have technical backgrounds, so err on the side of being conservative or offer explanations. If you're using initialisms or acronyms, spell them out and follow with the abbreviated form. If you use many such terms, consider including a glossary as part of the back matter. (Back matter is detailed in Chapter 12.)

AI-powered language tools, such as Grammarly or QuillBot, can provide suggestions for simplifying complex language, while AI-based readability checkers can evaluate whether the content is understandable to non-experts.

## Showing a positive attitude through your tone

A positive attitude conveys confidence in your ability to execute the project effectively. Your prompt may read:

*Convey a positive and tone for the following using the active voice and positive words:*

Using positive language such as *will* instead of tentative words such as *would* or *might* demonstrates your commitment and belief in achieving the proposed goals. Here's more that can be accomplished with a positive attitude:

- » **Building excitement and enthusiasm about your project idea.** Incorporating words with positive connotations such as *innovative*, *exciting*, and *constructive* can influence reviewers to view your proposal more favorably.
- » **Suggesting that you've carefully considered potential challenges and have a solutions-oriented mindset to overcome them.** This reassures reviewers of your preparedness.
- » **Reflecting a can-do spirit and willingness to persevere through the hard work required to successfully implement the proposed activities.** Funders want grantees who will make the most of their investment.

In essence, maintaining an upbeat, confident tone demonstrates to reviewers that you're passionate about your idea, have thoroughly planned for its execution, and have the determination to bring the mission to fruition successful. (There's lots more to discover about tone in Chapter 14.)

It tells of two shoe-factory scouts sent overseas to prospect for business. One scout sends a telegram saying, SITUATION HOPELESS [STOP] NO ONE WEARS SHOES. The other sends a telegram saying, GLORIOUS BUSINESS OPPORTUNITY [STOP] THEY HAVE NO SHOES. If these headlines were presented in an executive summary as "Findings," which would entice the reviewer?

## Presenting with impact

In the following figures you see different versions of the same executive summary, before and after some zing has been added. Here is the prompt used for both:

*Create an executive summary for the following document. Include an overview, key components, budget, benefits/measuring success, and conclusion. Limit to two pages.*

For the “after” version, the following was added to the prompt:

*Make this impactful, strong, yet approachable.*

Let’s consider the differences:

### » Before: Figures 10-1 and 10-2

- The opening paragraph is dull. It doesn’t offer anything to grab attention.
- Nothing pops out at a glance.
- There’s no reason to use numbers as there’s no priority.
- The budget section is clunky to follow.
- There’s no mention of how success will be measured.
- The conclusion falls flat.

### » After: Figures 10-3 and 10-4

- The proposal opens with alarming statistics that grab attention.
- Headlines make key information pop out at a glance.
- Bullets indicate no priority in the listing.
- The budget is displayed as a table, making it easy to follow.
- There are specific guidelines for measuring success.
- The conclusion boasts of how *Together We Can Make a Difference*.

## WRITING AN ABSTRACT

An abstract is different to an executive summary, yet they can use the same AI tools. To create an abstract, you'll write a prompt that focuses on summarizing the core content of the document in a brief and informative way, often with a focus on research findings, methodologies, or key arguments.

An *abstract* serves as an approximately 100- to 300-word synopsis of the entire proposal. Its purpose is to succinctly convey the key aspects of your project to reviewers and stakeholders, facilitating the evaluation process and promoting the dissemination of your research outcomes. It should address these issues:

- What you intend to do.
- Why the work is important.
- What's already been done.
- How you're going to do the work.

Here are some specific circumstances that call for an abstract:

- **Grant guidelines:** Many grant applications require an abstract as part of their submission requirements. Following these guidelines is crucial for your proposal to be considered.
- **Proposal length limitations:** Grant applications often have strict word or page limits. Including an abstract allows reviewers to quickly grasp the essence of your project without delving into the full proposal immediately.
- **Reviewer's initial assessment:** Reviewers may have to evaluate numerous proposals within a limited time frame. An abstract provides a quick overview, helping them decide whether your project aligns with the grant's objectives and merits further consideration.
- **Clarity and accessibility:** An abstract communicates the essence of your proposal in clear and accessible language. It allows both expert and non-expert readers to understand your project's purpose, methods, and potential impact without having to read the entire proposal.

- **Communication with stakeholders:** Granting agencies, potential collaborators, and the public may request project summaries for informational or promotional purposes. An abstract serves as an effective tool for communicating your project's goals and achievements to various stakeholders.

The placement of the abstract and the executive summary can vary depending on the specific requirements of the grantor. In some proposals, the abstract may appear before the executive summary, while in others, the executive summary may come first.

# Chapter 11

## Navigating a Request for Proposal

A *Request for Proposal* (RFP) is like a casting call for a blockbuster movie. The film studio (organization) puts out a detailed script (RFP) that includes the plot, the roles, and what they're looking for in actors and crew. This script is sent to a bunch of talent agencies (potential vendors or contractors) who then prepare and submit their auditions (proposals). Each showcases their unique take on how they would bring the project to life, and the studio (reviewer) evaluates all the submissions to choose the best.

This chapter helps you navigate the RFP process with precision and purpose, leveraging the tools to illuminate the path ahead.

## Finding Funders

Chapter 16 goes into greater detail about finding funders in the United States and abroad, but here's a little taster for finding funding:

- » **Applying cold.** This means reaching out to potential funders without a prior relationship or introduction, often through

unsolicited proposals or requests. This involves researching potential funders, understanding their priorities and guidelines, and submitting unsolicited proposals or grant applications. The advantage is a broad range of funding sources, but you must initiate the search.

- » **Responding to RFPs.** When individuals or organizations respond to RFPs, they're addressing specific funding opportunities that have been formally announced by the funding source. RFPs typically outline the objectives, eligibility criteria, and submission requirements. The advantage is the funder has provided a specific framework to follow; however, the competition may be intense.

# Contacting Funders Beforehand

While it's not feasible on every occasion, contacting the funder before submitting your proposal demonstrates your commitment, professionalism, and willingness to engage collaboratively and build rapport. Finding the right person can provide valuable information and insights that significantly improve your chances of success in securing the funding. Make sure to prepare your questions beforehand. For example:

- »» What are the primary objectives of the funding opportunity? Can you provide more detail or examples of the outcomes the funder hopes to achieve through this funding?
- »» Are there any specific requirements regarding the type of organization, geographic location, or project focus?
- »» Are there specific funding amounts allocated for different types of projects or activities?
- »» When can applicants expect to receive notification of funding decisions?
- »» What criteria will be used to evaluate proposals? How important are factors such as innovation, scalability, community impact, or previous experience?
- »» Are there any restrictions or limitations on how the funds can be used? Are there any activities or expenses that are not eligible for funding?
- »» What are the reporting requirements for funded projects? How often are progress reports or financial reports required, and what information should be included in these reports?
- »» Are there resources or guidance materials that can help applicants prepare strong proposals?
- »» Are partnerships or collaborations encouraged or required for this funding opportunity?
- »» Are there any specific expectations regarding the involvement of other organizations or stakeholders?
- »» Can they provide examples of past projects that have been funded through similar opportunities?
- »» Are there any success stories or lessons learned that can provide insights for prospective applicants?

Finding the right person to contact within the organization is helpful for getting the information you need. You can identify the right person in the following ways:

- » Reviewing the RFP document
- » Visiting the funder's website
- » Networking
- » Using social media and professional platforms such as LinkedIn
- » Checking previous communications
- » Calling the funder's main telephone number



REMEMBER

Regardless of the initial method of contact, remember the importance of following up. For example, if you reach out by phone, sending a follow-up email to summarize the conversation can create a written record and make you more memorable. AI can be of great value when drafting your follow-up.

- » **Tailoring your proposal by comparing RFP objectives with your proposed solution.** AI algorithms can help align your response to meet the specific needs and goals outlined in the RFP.
- » **Automating the application of the correct format and structure.** It can ensure that your proposal adheres to all specified sections, headings, page limits, and attachment requirements.
- » **Analyzing competitor proposals or market data to identify your unique strengths and value propositions.** It can suggest how best to articulate what sets your proposal apart.
- » **Drafting content that's detailed yet concise.** It can also assist in creating visuals and diagrams to illustrate key points effectively.

## Using a Match-Up Approach with the Help of AI



One of my clients kept missing out on funding worth millions and were adrift as to what kept going wrong. Their proposals were being turned down because funders claimed they hadn't answered all the questions requested in the RFP. But here's the kicker: They

actually had answered all the questions. The problem was, the answers were buried deep within the proposal. They asked for my help. To solve this problem and to make sure this didn't happen with the proposal I wrote for them, I crafted an annotated table of contents (TOC) with the help of AI, as demonstrated in Figure 11-1. I matched each requested item with its page number, using the exact language in the RFP. The proposal suddenly became a beacon of clarity in a sea of confusion. With this simple inclusion, funders could easily find the answers they sought. And the tide for this company turned. The proposal immediately garnered attention, swiftly leading to the company's securing not only that funding, but funding for several other projects by using the match-up approach.

As the clock strikes “Time to fund your dream project” you find yourself faced with the task of writing a grant proposal. This chapter takes you through the frenzy of writing a grant proposal, where the pen is mightier than the sword, and the grant proposal is your trusty machete. So sharpen your pencil and ready your mind, for you’re about to embark on a quest to unlock what it takes to prepare a funding-worthy masterpiece. From crafting a powerful executive summary that leaves the grant reviewer wanting more (like a cliffhanger in a thrilling novel) to meticulously outlining your project’s objectives and budget, you’ll be equipped with the knowledge and AI tools necessary to present your vision in a way that resonates with potential funders.



REMEMBER

The extent of information you include in each section is relative to how large the project is and how much money you request. This chapter includes a list of the typical parts of a large grant. Yours may not require all the inclusions. And before your forge ahead with writing a proposal, make sure to fill out the Kick-Start Brief found in Chapter 4. By following it, you’ll build a connection with

the reviewers, make it clear why your project is important. It can help to turn your ideas into a strong case for getting funded.

## Weaving AI into the Process

As you read through this chapter, you'll discover many ways that AI can be an indispensable ally. Sometimes I nudge you toward revisiting pertinent chapters in this book, and at other times I'll introduce you to AI tools tailored for a specific use. And yet other times, there'll be no AI reference because the task is a DIY-er (do-it-yourself-er) that needs to be addressed by writer intelligence (WI) — that's you and the proposal-writing team.



REMEMBER

If you're using any of the tools mentioned elsewhere in this book, be sure to adjust the tone and content to ensure that it aligns with your organization's voice.

## Building Partners, Not Grantors

Envision the intended grantor as your spirited partner in a grand quest — not as a mere benefactor. This will open up the realm of possibilities. Chapter 3 describes storytelling, but for now picture this: You (the valiant grant seeker) and the grantor (a fellow adventurer) are standing shoulder to shoulder, fueled by shared purpose and determination. Together, you forge a path toward your noble goal, weaving dreams into reality, and leaving bureaucratic hurdles in your wake. Paint a vivid picture of how your organization and the grantor will waltz through challenges, hand in hand. The grant proposal becomes more than words; it can become a saga of shared valor, an epic of mutual triumph!



REMEMBER

Recognizing the funder not merely as a financial supporter, but as a valued partner in the venture is crucial for fostering mutual collaboration, shared ownership, and sustained impact. Here are some examples of partnership phrases generated by AI that will help the funder feel involved in the project from the get-go:

**Prompt:** Give me 3 examples of phrases to let the funder know that we want a partnership, not just funds.

**AI's responses:**

*Your support as our partner in this project is invaluable, and we look forward to working hand in hand to address [specific issue] to make a meaningful impact.*

## Breaking Down the Sections of a Grant Proposal

A grant proposal should be presented in several sections to ensure that it's clear, comprehensive, and easy to navigate — ultimately enhancing its effectiveness and impact. This improved readability helps reviewers focus on content.

Throughout this section you'll find examples that plug into certain aspects of a grant proposal. They were generated by AI based on my prompts and demonstrate a grant proposal requesting \$150,000 to build an inner-city playground on a currently empty lot. The proposal highlights how the funds will benefit the children, the parents, and the community.

### Section 1: The beginning

Provide the hook. This is the section where you have the opportunity to grab the grant reviewer's attention. Let them know they're about to read a very interesting and worthwhile proposal. Don't promise the moon, but be honest and realistic.

Include the title page, table of contents, and executive summary. Although the cover letter (discussed in Chapter 8) is the first thing the reviewer sees, it's not considered part of "the beginning." You could say it begins the beginning.

## Cover letter (a.k.a. transmittal letter)

You'll submit a proposal in one of three ways: online, email, or snail mail. Every one of these requires a cover letter. If you're sending an actual letter, prepare it on your letterhead. Otherwise, you'll send it electronically, like the one in Figure 12-1. It's the first thing a grant reviewer sees and will be the basis of their first impression. It should convey the following in no more than three paragraphs:

- » A brief story that will appeal to hearts and minds. (Check out Chapter 3).
- » The undertaking and two of its major selling points.
- » The reasons you're applying for a grant.
- » An explanation that you're looking to partner with them, not just take their funding.

Dear Mr. Jameson:

In the heart of Yonkers, NY, an inner-city playground has sparked a remarkable transformation. The once barren and lifeless lot has been reborn as a lively gathering place for all to enjoy. Children now explore the colorful structures, sparking their imaginations, while families come together in shared joy and unity. This playground has cultivated friendships, improved children's health, and reignited hope, embodying the power of collective action and the endless possibilities of community investment.

The primary objective of requesting \$150,000 is to replicate that effort on another empty lot — to establish a secure, inclusive, and engaging environment where children and families can partake in active play, foster social bonds, and promote physical and mental wellness. Located strategically in a central locale of the city, the playground will be easily accessible to families residing in nearby neighborhoods.

We invite you to join us in championing this important cause. Together we can create a vibrant hub for recreation and social interaction, enriching the lives of individuals across our community. The playground will not only serve as a haven for fun and laughter but also as a catalyst for promoting health, inclusivity, and community cohesion. Writing the cover letter after completing the proposal is more effective because you can tailor it to the specifics emphasizing key points, and address any specific requirements or preferences outlined by the grant provider. Plus, once you've finished the proposal, AI can assist in crafting the cover letter, streamlining the

process and making a dynamic first impression. Learn more about the cover letter and relevant AI tools in Chapter 8.

## Title page

Specific requirements for a grant proposal title page may vary depending on the granting agency. If the funder gives specifications, carefully review them to ensure that the title page is formatted correctly and includes all the required information. If it's left to your discretion, include these in the following in this order:

- » Title of project (in a font larger than the rest)
- » Funder's name, address, and telephone number
- » Your organization's name and contact information
- » Submission date

## Table of contents

Creating a table of contents (TOC) for a proposal of more than 10 pages is essential to provide an organized overview of the proposal's structure and contents. This allows grant reviewers to quickly locate specific sections or information, providing a clear road map for navigating the entire document. Additionally, it demonstrates the proposal writer's thoroughness and attention to detail, which can positively influence reviewers' perceptions of the proposal's quality and professionalism.



REMEMBER

When responding to a lengthy Request for Proposal (RFP) (more about RFPs in Chapter 11), consider including a detailed TOC of where the grant reviewers can find everything they've requested. If you use Microsoft as your word processor, check out <https://www.ablebits.com/office-addins-blog/create-table-of-contents-word> to discover how it can generate a TOC. If you use another word processor, check its capabilities via an online search.

## Executive summary

Nearly 90 percent of all funding decisions are made before the potential reviewer finishes reading the executive summary!

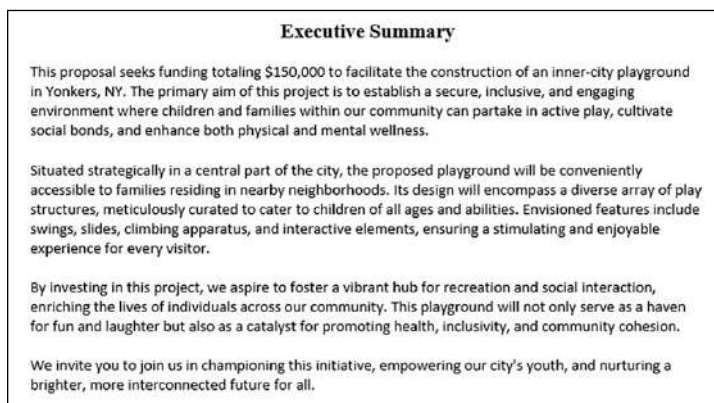


FIGURE 12-2: Executive summary generated by AI.

In the first paragraph, set the stage for the story. The “who, where, what, when, why, and how” that gives a hint of direction. During this time the grant reviewer is trying get some context, to understand where you’re headed, and how they fit into the journey. Make this section concise, persuasive, engaging, and include charts or tables where appropriate. Limit this to no more than three or four pages. See an example in Figure 12–2.

REMEMBER

Don't write the executive summary until you've written the proposal. Here's what to include:

- » Introduction of purpose
- » Project description
- » Methods and approach
- » Expected outcomes and impact
- » Budget
- » Relevant experience
- » Sustainability
- » Conclusion

## Section 2: The middle

This is the juicy, savory essence, the prime cut of content where you educate and powerfully convince. It should be informative, persuasive, and assuring. Lavish this section with stories and testimonials to let them know how their much-needed funds will be wisely spent, based on your past (or anticipated) success. These stories may show how your team was so efficient they completed the project ahead of schedule and under budget, or whatever your success story is.



REMEMBER

Incorporate your capacity to navigate the project's journey until completion, showcasing your organization's fervor for both your dedication to the project and its beneficiaries.

Include in this section the following: purpose (or introduction), problem statement, goals and objectives, budgetary needs, timetable, sustainability, promotion, target population, best practices, and qualifications.

### Purpose (or introduction)

In one page or less, introduce the following:

- » **Concept:** How this project fits into the philosophy and mission of the funder and your organization.
- » **Key elements of the program:** This includes the nature of project, timetable, anticipated outcomes, and staffing needs.
- » **Overview of the financials:** At this stage you may not be able to pinpoint all expenses, but you can present broad outlines.

In Figure 12-3, notice how graphics can play a critical part. Who with a heart could say “No” to joining your cause and funding the project to create those happy little faces?

### Problem statement

The problem statement in a proposal should strongly and succinctly describe the issues or challenges the proposed project aims to address.

### Purpose: Benefitting Children, Parents, and Community

We are requesting funding in the amount of \$150,000 to support the construction of an inner-city playground in Yonkers, NY. This playground will provide a safe, accessible, and inclusive space for children and families in our community to engage in active play, foster social connections, and promote physical and mental well-being. The proposed playground will be located in a central area of the city, easily accessible to families living in nearby neighborhoods. It will feature a variety of play structures suitable for children of all ages and abilities, including swings, slides, climbing structures, and interactive play elements.



This playground would offer numerous benefits. For children, it would provide opportunities for physical development through active play, fostering motor skills and overall health. Additionally, playgrounds support cognitive development by encouraging imaginative and exploratory play, enhancing problem-solving skills and creativity. Interacting with peers on the playground also helps children develop crucial social skills such as cooperation and communication.

For parents, this facility would offer peace of mind with safe environments for their children to play freely, promoting relaxation. This playground would also serve as a hub for community engagement, allowing parents to connect with others and build support networks. **AI's response:** The absence of a suitable playground in our inner-city neighborhood has created a significant gap in recreational opportunities for our community's children, resulting in limited physical activity and social interaction. The vacant lot currently serves as a stark reminder of this deficiency, offering no safe and constructive space for children to play and thrive.

*This lack of recreational infrastructure not only hinders the physical and social development of our children but also contributes to a sense of neglect within the community, exacerbating concerns about safety and well-being among parents and residents alike.*

## Goals and objectives



REMEMBER

Make sure your goals are SMART (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound). Express them in a powerful sentence to spark the imagination of the reviewers. Support your goal with the long- and short-term objectives, which are the steps along the way. Include the following:

- » Measurable milestones you will reach in meeting those goals and objectives.
- » How you will know that you're making progress towards your goals and objectives.

## Budgetary needs

You probably won't be able to pin down all the expenses until the details and timing are finalized. For the purpose of writing the grant, sketch out the broad outlines of the budget. Be sure the costs are in proportion to the outcomes you anticipate. Also, mention funding from other sources, such as volunteer services or other funders.



WARNING

If it appears that the costs will be prohibitive, scale back your plans or adjust them to remove expenses that aren't cost effective.



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI not only prepared the table you see in Figure 12-4, but it provided the allocation for funding, too. Most of the AI tools mentioned in Chapter 1 can prepare tables. In addition to preparing the table — without prompting — the AI tool showed potential funders for this project as shown in Figure 12-5. Voila!

## Timetable

State how long should this project should take and the steps along the way. If your grant proposal is short and the project is a simple one, you may say, *The project will start within 30 days of receiving the funding and will be completed six months from the start date.*

The search results indicate that there are various grants and funding sources available to help cover the costs of playground equipment and related projects. Some key points:

- The York County, VA Capital Improvements Program allocates funding for the repair and maintenance of recreational facilities, including playgrounds. <sup>1</sup>
- The Playground Equipment Grants and Stimulus Guide provides an overview of national and state-level grants that can be used for playground projects. <sup>2 3 4</sup>
- Potential funding sources include the National Parks Service Land and Water Conservation Fund, the Finish Line Youth Foundation, the Bureau of Land Management, and the PNC Foundation, among others. <sup>4</sup>

The total cost of \$150,000 for the playground equipment, site preparation, landscaping, and contingency fund appears to be within the range of funding available through these various grant programs. <sup>1 2 3 4</sup>

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AI can help with scheduling by anticipating potential delays, recommending workarounds, helping to schedule meetings, in addition to aiding with other time-management functions. Figure 12-6 showing the timetable for completing the playground was prepared by AI.

#### **6–8 Months before opening**

- Determine who will use the playground and their needs
- Assess the playground site and analyze space considerations
- Decide on a budget and explore funding options
- Choose playground equipment that fits the space and budget

#### **4–6 Months before opening**

- Obtain necessary permits from the city
- Prepare the site by improving drainage, slope, etc.
- Order playground equipment and surfacing materials

#### **2–3 Months before opening**

- Receive and store playground equipment and materials
- Prepare the site for installation, including groundwork

#### **1 Month before opening**

- Install playground equipment and surfacing
- Complete any additional site work like lighting, sidewalks

#### **2 Weeks before opening**

- Conduct final inspection and make any necessary repairs
- Prepare for grand opening celebration

#### **Opening Day**

- Celebrate the new playground with the community!

The key is to allow 6–8 months for the entire process, from planning to installation. Obtaining permits, preparing the site, and manufacturing custom equipment can each take 4–6 weeks. Ordering equipment early is critical, as lead times are typically 3–6 months. With proper planning and a realistic timeline, a basic inner-city playground can be built and ready for the community to enjoy

## **Sustainability**

Assuming the program proves successful and the initial funding ends, the focus should be on ensuring its sustainability. This involves developing a plan for the program to eventually run independently and seeking alternative funding sources if necessary. Additionally, it may be beneficial to explore the possibility

of obtaining further support from the current grantor to continue the program's impact and success.

SPOTLIGHT

AI can aid with sustainability by optimizing resource use, predicting and mitigating environmental impacts, and improving efficiency in energy and waste management. It can also enhance decision-making through data analysis, support the development of sustainable technologies, and monitor and analyze environmental changes for better planning and adaptation.

## Promotion

Outline your plans for promoting the program. Through a public relations campaign? Through community affairs organizations? In professional journals? If you have existing marketing literature, send it along.



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI can be a valuable partner in developing promotional strategies. This can include community events and fundraisers, media coverage, visual collateral, and social media coverage. You could ask your AI tool to flesh each one out and come up with a comprehensive promo plan.

## Target population

If your target population is a factor, detail who they are. For example, an organization doing research on a specific disease may do a study whose target population is a certain ethnic group of certain ages. Do this by

- » Gathering relevant data and statistics that support the need for the proposed project or program. This will help you demonstrate the significance and impact of your work.
- » Highlighting any existing collaborations or partnerships with organizations or stakeholders that have experience working with the target population and your commitment to working collaboratively and leveraging existing resources and expertise . . . in addition to sharing your findings.



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI can help identify the target population by analyzing large sets of data to find patterns and trends. It can segment populations based on various factors like demographics or behaviors, and predict which groups are most likely to benefit from a program or product. This makes targeting more precise and effective.

## Best practices

How will you share the success of your project with other organizations or communities? Will you share the “lessons learned” so others can learn from what worked and what didn’t work? Also, what best practices from others will you apply to this process?



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI can identify best practices by: analyzing successful examples and patterns; evaluating clarity, organization, and relevance; and comparing the proposal’s content against industry standards and benchmarks.

## Qualifications



REMEMBER

Many groups are vying for the same dollars. Detail why you’re more qualified or better able to reach your goal:

- » If you’ve had a breakthrough or success on something similar in the past, be specific about how you met your goals.
- » Use percentages and dollar amounts. They can be powerful.
- » If you have notable people who’ll lead the charge, include a brief paragraph about them, and prepare resumes to appear in the appendixes (see the next section).

## Section 3: The conclusion and back matter



REMEMBER

The conclusion offers you one last chance to convince the grantor to fund your initiative. Here are some tips to help you craft a memorable conclusion:

- » Restate the problem
- » Recap the objectives

- » Showcase the feasibility
- » Highlight innovation
- » Express confidence
- » Throw in a testimonial from a person or group who benefited in the past.
- » Call to action with the grantor as a partner, not a funder

Included in this section are the appendixes and glossary. However, back matter can also include references, bibliographies, supplementary documents, case studies or examples, additional budget details, legal or compliance information, special certifications, contact information, or anything else that didn't appear in other parts of the proposal. This gives reviewers access to all relevant information they need to make an informed decision.

## Appendixes

This is one more opportunity for sharing stories. Consider including a section titled “More About Our Successes” or “More About Our Team.” These success stories can be lengthier (a page or more) and can include case studies. Even though this isn't a standard part of a grant proposal, it adds credibility and sets you apart from the competition.



REMEMBER

This section is *not* an afterthought or a place to stick random information. It should be a carefully curated section that adds depth and validation to your proposal. Be mindful of keeping to what's absolutely necessary to round out your proposal. You don't want to overwhelm.

## Glossary

Throughout the grant proposal, keep industry-specific terms, acronyms, or initialisms to a minimum. Although there's no magic number, include a glossary when you have many terms you think the reviewers may not be familiar with. This is truly a judgment call.



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI can help to tailor the definitions according to your reviewer's needs, ranging from simple to technical language. But always remember, it's WI that must give the proposal a final blessing.

## REMEMBERING THE DO'S AND DON'TS

As you finalize your proposal, keep these key guidelines in mind to enhance your submission and avoid common mistakes:

- Do consider ethical considerations such as honesty and accuracy, conflicts of interest, responsible conduct of research, inclusivity and diversity, protection of names, animal welfare, environmental impact, community engagement and stakeholder consultation, data management and sharing, and intellectual property rights.
- Do describe your program with facts, statistics, and passion using action-packed words such as *achieving*, *cooperating*, *enhancing*, *establishing*, *existing*, *expanding*, *overall*, *strategies*, and the like.
- Do present your goals with visionary language and your objectives with measurable terms using high-performance words such as *decreasing*, *delivering*, *developing*, *establishing*, *improving*, *increasing*, and *producing*.
- Don't beat around the bush about future funding. Use words such as *creating future fundraising partners*, *inviting more external funding sources*, *local fundraising*, *seeking to identify more stakeholders*, to name a few.
- Don't use statements that say the obvious such as *illiteracy is a barrier to employment*, *clean water is essential*, *many of the world's population live in chronic hunger*, *homelessness is a serious issue*, and similar.

## Making a List and Checking It Twice

Before submitting your proposal give it one — or two! — final checks over. In addition to proofreading and editing your proposal for obvious errors, here's a checklist of things to look for that only WI can detect:

### ☐ Overall Structure and Flow

- Is the proposal organized logically with clear sections (such as the introduction, objectives, methods, and budget)?

- Does each section flow smoothly into the next, providing a coherent narrative?

☐ **Storytelling**

- Did you include stories that tug at heartstrings and open wallets?
- Did you pepper the proposal with story testimonials?

☐ **Clarity and Conciseness**

- Are technical terms defined or explained appropriately?
- Have you avoided unnecessary jargon that could confuse reviewers?

☐ **Grammar and Punctuation**

- Are sentences grammatically correct?
- Are punctuation marks (such as commas and semicolons) used correctly?

☐ **Consistency**

- Are formatting styles (for example, headings, font sizes, and spacing) consistent throughout the document?
- Are abbreviations and acronyms consistently used and defined?

☐ **Accuracy and Completeness**

- Have you verified all facts, figures, and statistical data cited in the proposal?
- Are all references properly cited, and do they support your arguments?

☐ **Readability and Presentation**

- Is the text easy to read, with clear and concise language?
- Have you used bullet points, tables, and effectively to present complex information?

☐ **Persuasiveness and Impact**

- Does the proposal effectively convey the significance and potential impact of the project?
- Have you clearly outlined how the project aligns with the grant's objectives and priorities?

☐ **Review for Specific Requirements**

- Have you followed the grant application guidelines and included all required elements (for example, project summary, budget, and supporting documents)?
- Have you addressed any specific criteria or questions outlined in the grant application?

#### ☐ **Peer Review and Feedback**

- Have you sought feedback from colleagues or mentors on the content and structure of the proposal?
- Have you incorporated constructive feedback to strengthen the proposal?

#### ☐ **Final Proofreading**

- Have you carefully proofread the entire proposal for typos, spelling errors, and formatting inconsistencies?
- Consider using spellcheck tools and reading the proposal aloud to catch any remaining issues.

By following this checklist, you can ensure that your grant proposal is well-polished, coherent, and compelling for reviewers.

## Following Up After Submitting Your Proposal

Following up with a funder after submitting a grant proposal is crucial for several reasons: It demonstrates your interest and commitment, builds a relationship, increases your visibility, and shows professionalism.



REMEMBER

Prepare a concise message expressing gratitude for the opportunity to apply and politely request an update on the status of your application. Being patient and understanding throughout the process can help maintain a positive impression while ensuring your inquiry is productive. For example:

**Prompt:** *Please write a friendly 2-paragraph message inquiring about the status of my proposal. Ask for an update and when I may expect to hear.*

### AI's response:

*I am reaching out to inquire about the status of our grant application submitted on [date]. We're excited about the opportunity to partner with you and are eager to hear any updates you might have. Do you have any idea when that may be?*

*Thank you so much for your time and consideration. If there's any additional information you need, please let me know.*

*Most sincerely,*

## Knowing how to follow up

Here are some ways to follow up:

- » **Emailing:** Send a polite and concise email to the contact person or the appropriate department. Express gratitude for the opportunity to submit the proposal, reiterate your enthusiasm for the project, and politely inquire about the status of your application. AI can draft this follow-up.
- » **Making a phone call:** Follow up with a phone call if a number was provided. A phone call allows for more immediate feedback and clarification. Make sure to prepare a script or talking points beforehand and be respectful of the recipient's time. Again, AI can help formulate questions.
- » **Requesting a meeting:** If feasible, request a meeting to discuss your proposal in more detail. This can provide an opportunity for deeper engagement and to address any concerns the funder may have.
- » **Using social media:** Engage with the funder on social media platforms such as LinkedIn or X. This can help keep your project on their radar and demonstrate your proactive approach.
- » **Attending events:** If the funder hosts or attends events, consider attending to network and make a personal connection. This can help strengthen your relationship with the funder and increase the chances of your proposal being considered.
- » **Sending additional information:** If the funder requests additional information or documentation (or if you just want to send something to remind them of your proposal), be sure to provide them promptly. This demonstrates your responsiveness and willingness to collaborate.

## Knowing when to follow up

It's important to check the specified time frame for hearing back on applications and adhere to any guidelines regarding follow-ups provided by the grantor. Typically, it's advisable to wait two to four weeks after the application deadline before politely reaching. Some funders post updates on their websites.



REMEMBER

Waiting can be tough but it's all part of the process. Stay optimistic — sometimes the best things take a little longer to come together. Your patience and persistence will pay off. If not this time, you can always try again.

This presentation is your moment to captivate the reviewers with your charisma, intellect, passion, and conviction. Your proposal must win over the grant reviewing panel and secure vital funding through its innovative storytelling and emotional depth.

# Peeking Behind the Curtain of the Review Process

Review processes can vary greatly, akin to the assorted flavors in a box of chocolates. Factors such as the funding body, the nature of the grant, and the expertise of the reviewers contribute to this range. As the review process unfolds, proposals are progressively scrutinized, leading to heightened competition as weaker submissions are weeded out. The following steps are the fullest extent of a review process:

1. **Initial screening**
2. **Peer review**
3. **Panel review or committee evaluation**
4. **Finalists presentations (optional by funder)**
5. **Grant awarded**

## Remembering That AI Can Help



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI can be a valuable tool in preparing for and delivering a presentation as a finalist for a grant. One of the key ways is generating content with tools such as HyperWrite (<https://www.hyperwriteai.com/aitools/ai-speech-writer>) and Verble (<https://www.verble.app>). Also, tools such as Presentr (<https://www.thepresentr.me>) and Ovation (<https://www.ovationvr.com>) can provide simulated practice sessions where you can rehearse your presentation. They can offer feedback on aspects such as pacing, tone, and clarity, helping you refine your delivery.

Other opportunities to lean on AI are highlighted elsewhere in this chapter.

## Assessing the Review Panel

Typically, you might not know the people on the review panel, but you can often infer general characteristics based on the panel's purpose or the field of study. For example, if it's a grant

proposal for scientific research, you can assume panel members have expertise in that scientific area. Understanding the general background and interests of your audience helps you tailor your presentation effectively. You can prepare by understanding the criteria, highlighting key points, anticipating questions, and practicing your pitch.

## Crafting Your Presentation's Message

Crafting your message for the panel requires careful consideration of their interests, priorities, and the objectives of the grant request. Effectively tailor your message by:

- » Understanding the grant criteria
- » Highlighting the problem and solution
- » Focusing on impact
- » Sharing a compelling story.
- » Highlighting your team's expertise
- » Addressing potential challenges
- » Being clear and concise
- » Demonstrating sustainability
- » Tailoring to the audience

AI can help with all these points to increase your chances of making a compelling case for your project and securing the grant funding you need to bring your vision to life.

# Nailing Your Presentation

When people hear the word *presentation*, their minds automatically shift to a slide presentation. A presentation doesn't necessarily mean a slide presentation. The type of presentation will depend on the preferences of the grant committee, the nature of your project, and/or your own strengths as a presenter. Here are some typical types of presentations:

- » Interactive
- » Multimedia
- » Peer review
- » Problem-solution
- » Storytelling
- » Videoconferencing
- » Slides or videos
- » Pitch to sell your idea



SHERYL  
SAYS

Take a look at the TV show *Shark Tank*. It's like a crash course in pitching ideas and selling visions. Entrepreneurs face the daunting task of articulating their concepts succinctly, highlighting their unique value proposition, and demonstrating market potential — all under the scrutiny of savvy investors. It's a masterclass in persuasion, where clarity, passion, and a solid business plan can turn a fledgling idea into a lucrative opportunity. Check out the nearby sidebar, "Daring to be different," for an example of how this can help you to win a grant.

## DARING TO BE DIFFERENT

Carlo attended my presentation workshop. He was one of five finalists competing for a large research grant. Initially, he approached me with a stack of data-filled slides, hoping they would bolster his chances during his upcoming presentation. Seeing an opportunity for improvement, I challenged Carlo to rethink his approach. I painted a vivid scenario of the presentation day, urging him to consider how to keep the reviewers engaged amidst potentially dry presentations from his

competitors. Drawing inspiration from the dynamic pitches seen on shows such as *Shark Tank*, I encouraged Carlo to abandon his slides in favor of a narrative-driven approach. I emphasized the importance of storytelling and crafting a memorable experience for the review panel, rather than overwhelming them with charts and graphs.

Initially hesitant, Carlo eventually embraced the challenge. He restructured his presentation to focus on storytelling, weaving together anecdotes of past successes and the broader impact of his research. Additionally, he meticulously prepared personalized handouts that highlighted key points to further illustrate his narrative. When the day of the presentations arrived, Carlo boldly took the stage as the first presenter. His approach resonated deeply with the grant reviewers who found his presentation refreshing and impactful. He set the bar very high.

Carlo's decision to prioritize storytelling and engagement proved to be a game-changer — he not only stood out, but he handily secured the grant! This solidified his reputation as a compelling communicator and strategic thinker. He was the hero.

## Preparing Slides Using AI Tools

Slide presentations are the most commonly sought after and the most commonly used types of presentations. They can be great for storytelling (check out Chapter 3). Remember that each slide is a canvas, awaiting the brushstrokes of clarity and insight. There are many helpful tools out there, and a few of the most popular are:

REMEMBER

To avoid overwhelming your reviewers, focus on clear, concise, and meaningful visuals. Use engaging content and strategic pauses to maintain interest, prioritizing substance over style to create impactful presentations. Here are a few helpful do's and don'ts:

#### » Formatting do's for slides

- Use a 24-point font for headlines and 18-point for text.
- Use upper and lower case, never all caps (even for the headline).
- Limit each visual to 5–7 lines of text.
- Use bulleted or numbered lists.
- Left-justify bullets and numbers.
- Limit bullets to one line of text when possible.
- Consider a *sans serif font* (such as Arial) for the headlines and a *serif font* (such as Times New Roman) for the text. Use black text on a light-colored background for the best readability.
- When using graphics and bullets on the same slide, place graphics either to left or right of the bulleted list.

#### » Formatting don'ts for slides

- Avoid animation and sound effects (unless they're absolutely necessary). They're distractions.
- Avoid using italics (they decrease readability).
- Avoid the overuse of bullets with layers of sub-bullets.

## Preparing Handouts That Leave a Lasting Impression

People like takeaways. If you've ever been to a tradeshow, you've witnessed how attendees grab literature, pens, pads, key chains, candy, and any other free gizmos on the tables. Most of these

things get thrown away; the important things are kept and shared. Your review panel likes takeaways as well. They'll serve as memory refreshers after "Elvis has left the building." A handout is a wonderful way to add even more value to your presentation, regardless of the type you choose.

## Making your handout shine



AI  
SPOTLIGHT

AI can help to add credence to your topic by locating articles, quotes, analogies, and other content, such as:

- » Success stories and testimonials
- » Simplified charts, tables, and diagrams
- » Case studies to show working examples of your mission
- » Relevant websites and blogs
- » Magazine, journal, and newspaper articles (with written permission from the publisher and/or author).



REMEMBER

Be certain that each page displays your organization's name, contact information, and copyright notice. Attach your business card, and staple the handout about a half inch away from the edge of the paper, at a 45-degree angle on the left side. This positioning helps ensure visibility.

## Including extras

You'll want the handout to extend beyond your presentation or to be given to reviewers who didn't attend. Kick your handout up a notch by including: lists; relevant content that's not in your presentation; references such as websites, blogs, articles, books, journals, and whitepapers; and anything else that will enhance the panel's experience.

# Anticipating Questions

Anticipating questions from the review panel is crucial for preparing thorough and well-rounded responses during your presentation. You can effectively anticipate the panel's questions by:

- » Putting yourself in their shoes
- » Reviewing the proposal criteria
- » Thinking about potential concerns
- » Considering previous feedback
- » Researching previous grantees
- » Preparing responses in advance

By proactively anticipating questions from the review panel, you can better prepare yourself to respond effectively, demonstrate your expertise, and address any concerns they may have, ultimately increasing your chances of securing the grant funding.

SPOTLIGHT

Tools such as ChatGPT (<https://chatgpt.com>) and Grammarly (<http://www.grammarly.com>) can analyze past review panel questions, identify common themes, and generate probable questions based on your content.

# Practicing Your Way to Perfection

Rehearse your presentation multiple times to ensure that you're comfortable with the material and can deliver it confidently. Practice in front of a mirror, with colleagues, or record yourself to identify areas for improvement. Then, prepare for the big day by:

- » Gathering supporting materials
- » Making sure your technology is working properly
- » Dressing appropriately
- » Arriving early
- » Staying calm and confident
- » Wowing them!

AI tools such as VirtualSpeech (<http://virtualspeech.com>) and Orai (<https://orai.com>) can enhance your presentation by providing real-time feedback on delivery, helping to refine content, and simulating audience interactions to boost your confidence and effectiveness.



REMEMBER

Be open to feedback. By demonstrating a receptive attitude and a willingness to engage with reviewers constructively, you position yourself as a thoughtful and collaborative researcher deserving of support and funding. This dialogue will build rapport, enhance your credibility, and increase your chances of success.

## MOVING FORWARD WITH RENEWED FOCUS

Despite your best efforts, the proposal may be rejected. Perhaps competition was fierce, the budget or timeline were unrealistic, there were geopolitical or economic factors, or other valid reasons. Regardless the reason, it's like planning an elaborate surprise party for someone, putting in weeks of effort, and then the guest of honor is a no-show at the last minute. But instead of seeing rejection as a defeat, spin it like a compass pointing you toward unexpected adventures and renew your focus. Consider it a detour on the road to uncovering the pot of gold; after all, sometimes the most beautiful vistas are found off the beaten path.

## **Requesting feedback**

Contact the funder. It's not just about understanding why the proposal didn't make the cut; it's about gathering insights to refine your approach, strengthening your weaknesses, and ultimately increasing your chances of reaching that coveted destination the next time. Embrace the feedback loop as a crucial part of the journey — a compass guiding you toward your pot of gold, even if it's hidden behind a few more bends in the road and if being guarded by a cunning leprechaun.

## **Asking questions**

Here are examples of questions you can ask the funder (but don't overwhelm them with too many):

- Were the goals and objectives of the project clearly articulated?
- Were the methods and approach described in sufficient detail to understand how the project would be executed?
- How could the proposal be strengthened to better demonstrate its significance and innovation?
- Were there any methodological weaknesses or gaps in the proposed approach?
- Did the reviewers have any concerns about the budget allocation or justification?
- Were there any opportunities for additional collaborations or partnerships that were not addressed in the proposal?

If the funder doesn't respond, you can use the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) after a proposal has been rejected by a government agency. This will get you the information you want, especially if you suspect unfairness or lack of transparency in the decision-making process. For more information visit <http://www.foia.gov>.

## Focusing on the Grantor

Focus on the grantor to increase your chances of securing funding for your project. Phrases such as *together we can . . .* suggest partnership and mutual support towards a common objective, not just a plea for funding.
